Beginning Quiltmaking - Marty Frolli

Tuesdays, 9:00 am - noon, Room T-2, Wake Center

Wednesdays, 9:00 am - noon, Room 2, Wake Center

Learn the fundamentals of quiltmaking while constructing a small sampler quilt. Covers traditional and contemporary techniques of piecing, appliqué and quilting.

Charm Quilts - Marty Frolli

Thursdays, 9:00 am - noon, Room T-2, Wake Center

Charm quilts are a distinctive type of American quilt, in which each piece is cut from a different fabric. Take delight in stitching up a small charm quilt such as, Thousand Pyramids or Flying Geese.

Basket Sampler Quilt - Marty Frolli

Fridays, 9:00 am - noon, Room 2, Wake Center

You'll master a variety of quilt making techniques while piecing together a collection of basket blocks. The selection will include Stamp Basket and Fruit Basket, Dresden Basket and Crazy Quilt Basket.

The colors used in a quilt can make or break a project. Fabric is one of the most difficult mediums to use, as we are often totally at the mercy of the manufacturers as to what colors we can use. Come and experiment with color as we learn more about this important aspect of quilting.

Sunbonnet Cats - A hand appliqué class suitable for beginners to advanced. These adorable cats go together quickly! <u>Instructor - Melody Bollay</u>

Hidden Wells - The fabric makes the quilt! This easy to piece quilt will look entirely different each time you make it - no two are ever alike. Basic sewing experience recommended. Instructor - Maggie Godwin

Karen Pickford

Karen is a native Texan, but left there when her husband was transferred with his job. Since then, they have lived in Oklahoma, Colorado, New Jersey and now in California. They have been here for 14 years and hope they don't have to move anymore.

Karen has a seven year old son and is active in his school. She is also the past president for the Post Partum educational program at the school. She has been a kindergarten teacher and also worked in marketing for several years. She has won many prizes in national magazines for her cross stitching and she has had several designs published.

Eight years ago, she decided to learn to quilt & took a class with Mary Blaylock. A lap sized quilt grew into a king size.

Karen has won prizes at the county fair, at our challenge last year, and again this year, and at the California State Fair in Sacramento. She has combined her cross stitching with quilted garments and produced prize winners. She is very talented.

Quilting Tip

Source Unknown

Clip a small triangle off each corner on the selvage edge before washing your fabric. It prevents the fabric from raveling and is also an indicator that you have washed that piece of fabric already. This tip was tried by me and Connie Stone and we both found it to work very well.

Teacher Tip - by Marty Frolli

Grainline

Straight grain refers to either lengthwise or crosswise grain. The lengthwise threads (or warp) run parallel to the selvage edges and have very little stretch. The crosswise threads (or weft) run perpendicular to the selvage edges and have some stretch. The bias runs at a 45 degree angle to the lengthwise and crosswise threads and has the most stretch.

Square templates are positioned with all sides on straight grain. Triangles are positioned with one or two sides on the straight grain. Diamonds are positioned with the straight grain running from point to point. (Exceptions occur when a specific visual effect is the goal.)

The outside edge of the quilt block should be on grain. A straight grain edge sewn to another straight grain edge is the strongest combination. A straight grain edge sewn to a bias edge is the second choice. A bias edge sewn to another bias edge should be avoided when possible.

Sew with the "Bias on the Bottom", when sewing a bias edge to a straight grain edge.

Nadi will have a show-and-tell of antique and new quilts and tops from her collection featuring plaids and stripes. This is an excellent workshop for the beginning to intermediate quilter.



CUT: 4 paws : 4 1/2 inches square - blue 1 center square - 2 1/2 inches - blue


claws: 8 of 27/8 inch squares blue on white cut on diagonal to make
