May Lecture & Workshop



June Lecture & Workshop

Photo Transfer to Fabric. How many times have you seen a quilt with photographic images on it and asked yourself "how did they do that"? Quilters have always loved fabrics with the images of people imprinted on them. Historically such fabrics have been incorporated into quilts that have been used to make political statements, support social reform, raise funds for charities and above all, to tell personal stories. Early needleworkers tried paints and embroidery techniques to put faces on their work with varying degrees of success. Over the years technology made printed textiles available. But ways to get personal imagery on fabric involved complicated, messy and often toxic processes - until today. Contemporary quilters and textile artists are exploring new technologies and coming up with wonderful results. Easily accessible computers and photocopy machines have made it simple. inexpensive and fun to transfer your own images to fabric. With slides, this lecture will attempt to unravel the mysteries of "How did they do that".

June Workshop Photo Transfer to Fabric

In this workshop you will learn to transfer black and white copies of your family photos or artwork to fabric. Without damage to your original! We will focus on the mending tape method, which does not require the use of toxic solvents or expensive equipment. The transfers can be hand colored and transferred to 100% cotton fabrics or synthetics. Best of all they can be washed in the washer and dried in the dryer.

Other techniques for transferring photos to fabrics will be discussed and demonstrated in the classroom - including methods of transferring color images. You will be able to explore some of the processes and determine the best ones for your own projects. Excellent handouts will allow you to polish your skills at home. You will leave the class with your own photos transferred to fabric and lots of inspiration and techniques to use in you future pro-

It really is a good opportunity to display your creations to a large number of people. The timing of our fair is excellent. Halloween, Thanksgiving and Christmas will be just around the corner and people who enjoy crafts will be in the market to add to their stash. There were some suggestions made at the last meeting of items you might consider making. Perhaps some of the following may help:

For all of these holidays and also seasonal - table decorations, napkin rings, place mats, door wreaths and decorations. mantle decorations. Christmas ornaments are always a big hit. Sweatshirts and decorated T shirts for adults and children go well. Often boutique items are used for gifts. For children consider dolls and stuffed animals, bags to carry "stuff" in, knapsacks, tooth fairy pillows, baby items such as bibs, diaper covers, crib quilts and floor quilts. Around the house items might include phone book and pocket book covers, refrigerator magnets, flower pot covers, pillows, pot holders, shopping bags, sewing carry alls, etc. Some wonderful sewing related jewelry has been crafted.

It is strongly suggested when you price your items, be re-

alistic. Remember, the Guild is to receive 20% of what you sell the item for. Try to produce your creations in an assembly line fashion to make the best use of your time. Each seller will be responsible foe attaching information on their goods including the price and any other necessary information such as size or care, etc. There will be more to follow on this.

PLEASE MAKE SOME TOUCHY FEELIES

A "TOUCHY FEELIE" block is one you just can't resist. Your hand just HAS to examine it, to caress it, to join in its "feeliness."

The Guild is preparing to assemble one of these special quilts. It will be seen first at our October show, where it will fulfill the tactile needs of children and adults alike. Later it will tour the schools, so that as many children as possible will have an up close and personal look at a quilt.

To participate, please make blocks at least 6 1/2 to 7 inches square (to finish at 6 inches). Use whatever designs and materials you wish, remembering that you are inviting the viewer to approach and explore. This is the time to use ALL sorts of unusual materials, to machine embroider, to embellish. (Your Guild President once put a real rattlesnake's rattler on a quilt).

Make as many as your inspirations lead you...sign them on the back if you wish...bring them to Guild meetings where they will be displayed with the Blocks of the Month. After the August meeting they will be assembled into a quilt to be ready for the September meeting.

SISTER'S CHOICE

Once again, simple pieces create complex designs. Much as in our Guild, where simple acts of sewing together create lasting bonds of friendship.


To make the block: cut seventeen 2 1/2 inch squares and eight half square triangles. (Diagonally cut 2 7/8 inch squares to get the triangles)

Colors: red, white, blue

Placement of colors: Your choice, sister!

Materials: stars, stripes, plaids, polka dots; (all 100% cotton)

Sew together as shown below. Block will be 10 1/2 " to finish at 10".



Clams On the Half Shell

May class description: Discover the wonderful effects that happen when you combine strip piecing with curves. The complex visual designs are really sew simple.

Supply List:
Inexpensive graph paper
Lead pencils
C-thru ruler
Draftsman compass (one with
greater than 6" radius, opt.)
Paper scissors
Glue stick
Heavy duty Exacto Knife or
utility scissors
Rotary cutter and mat/ and or
Sharp fabric scissors
Sewing machine and general
sewing supplies.

Template materials:

- **Illustration board
- ** Medium grade sandpaper
- **Will be available for purchase in class if you prefer.

Fabrics:

This class makes use of several different samples. Each one is a different design created with the same template. Your fabric choices and the number of different fabrics you use also influence the way your quilt will look. Therefore, these fabric amounts are only general guidelines. Choose your fabrics as you would for a Log Cabin quilt. Have at least three values of fabrics, light, medium & dark. High contrast or busy fabrics tend to overpower the curves. Try to include accent fabrics in your groupings.

1/3 to 1/2 yard of 6 to 16 different fabrics.

All fabrics need to be pre-rinsed to remove excess dye, dried in the dryer to control shrinkage, pressed and folded to insure accurate cutting.

INSURING YOUR QUILTS

The insurance companies, for the most part, look on a quilt as a "blanket" and ask why anyone would want to insure a "blanket." If a company does write the insurance for this quilt, it will probably be on a form that really doesn't fit the concerns of the quilt owner since the "miscellaneous floater" form doesn't contemplate the problems that fabrics can undergo.

There are two companies that write special coverages for quilts and related materials that do take these unique problems into account. This coverage is readily available through an agency in Phoenix that I am associated with. Either of us can answer your questions and can quickly give quotes for coverage.

Some categories of ownership of guilts are:

Private Ownership of Quilts

This is by far the largest group of quilt owners. It is also the easiest to misunderstand where and how the quilts are covered. The homeowners' (or renters') policy that you have will cover your quilt if it is an "ordinary" quilt that can be replaced easily. The insurance company will look at your quilt, if lost or damaged, as a common bedcovering. That is, they will pay for the replacement of the quilt if it can be quickly replaced with one of the same or similar style. The same holds true if an antique table were lost or damaged. The adjuster will pay for a table of similar size and stile, but will <u>not</u> pay for its antique value as such. The same will hold true for your quilt; they will pay for a quilt, but not for its antique or collector's value.

Some insurance companies will issue a "floater" endorsement to your homeowners' policy. This "floater" will add your quilt(s) for an amount for which you choose to insure the quilt. If you were to suffer a loss or claim on that quilt, it would be up to you, the owner, to prove that value. You would be best served to have a certified appraisal in your possession to substantiate the value.

Your quilt(s) will be covered under your homeowners' policy while at home, or away from home while in your possession. Remember that 10% of the value of your personal possessions at home will extend while you are away from home. However, if you loan your quilt to another person or group for the purpose of displaying your quilt, there is no coverage under your homeowners' policy. This must be covered by the person or group to whom you have entrusted your quilt. Always make sure that the person or group is adequately insured for your quilt. Again, a certified appraisal is important to you in the event of a loss or claim.

If you are transporting your quilt(s) in your automobile and have a loss, your <u>automobile</u> <u>insurance policy does not cover your personal possessions in the car</u>. Your homeowner's policy does.

The above statements regarding your personal insurance policies are general statements of coverage. Some specific policies may be broader or more restrictive than others. For your protection, always consult with your agent for specific questions of coverage and ask him or her for an answer *in writing*. Never, never rely on a casual word on the phone as a complete answer to your coverage questions. This is known as CYA (cover your assets).
