
In 1992 I opened The Wild Hare. It is a gift shop for people who love gardening and accesorizing their homes.

## FOLK ART SAMPLER

Start with a theme block and build from it echoing the theme until you have whimsical design resembling a sampler. ## Supply List

Background: Think of the background as a quiet backdrop for the appliqué images. When choosing the background think about the contrast that is needed for the images to show up. If the background is light or medium then the images have to be bright or dark. You will need a total of I to I 1/2 yd. You may use one fabric or a variety of fabrics. Make sure all fabrics are washed and pressed.

Appliqués: Come with a variety of scrap fabrics for the appliqués totaling at least 1 to 1 1/2 yd. Medium to smaller prints and checks, solids and textures will work best. Think about texture. It is nice to see a variety in the fabric selection.

<u>Patterns:</u> Will be provided. If you have other images you would like to incorporate bring them. You might want to go to a copy machine and enlarge and reduce them so you have a variety of sizes to choose from.

## The Becipe Corner Ginger-Carrot Pie

basic pie crust 1 1/2 c. Unseasoned pureed cooked carrot 3 eggs 1/3 c. sugar

1/3c honey

freshly grated zest of 1 orange

2 tb.s. chopped candied ginger

1 t.s. ground nutmeg

1/2 t.s. ground cinnamon

1/4 t.s ground allspice

1/2 t.s salt

1 c. Heavy cream

Preheat oven to 425°F. Roll out the pastry and use to line a 9-inch pie pan.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the carrot, eggs, sugar, honey, orange zest, and spices. Beat until smooth. Stir in the cream and beat until well blended. Pour the carrot mixture into the pastry shell. Bake for 15 minutes, then reduce the heat to 300°F and bake until the filling is set around the edges and a knife inserted slightly off-center comes out clean, 30-40 minutes longer. Serve warm or at room temperature







### **BLOCK OF THE MONTH**

## TO LOVE OR KNOT?

That is the question to be answered by our winner! This log cabin variation can be set in the bright "Lovers Knot" pattern- or not. Either way, red and black will provide the drama. Make two blocks per entry (don't panic, they're easy!)

Select <u>4 fabrics</u>: a bright red print, a black print, and two others with muted characteristics (e.g. soft floral or mottled).

For Block A you'll need: 2 pieces of red fabric, a 2"x5", a 2"x6 1/2"

1 piece of black fabric, 2"x2"

2 pieces of background fabric #1, a 2"x3 1/2", a 2"x5"

2 pieces of background fabric #2, a 2"x2", a 2"x3 1/2"

For Block B you'll need: 2 pieces of black fabric, a 2"x5", a 2"x6 1/2"

1 piece of red fabric, 2"x2"

2 pieces of background fabric #2, a 2"x3 1/2", a 2"x5"

2 pieces of background fabric #1, a 2"x2", a 2"x3 1/2"

Challenge: Use a true ‡" seam allowance- not too fat and not too thin. Or if you prefer, draw out on lightweight paper or interfacing and use the flip and sew method- if you've never tried foundation piecing, this is a good place to start. Use the diagram below as a guide:

MAKE YOUR OWN FOUNDATION with paper or lightweight interfacing Using a gridded square ruler, draw a 6" square. Add a  $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance all around. Starting in one corner, mark a  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " square. Move the ruler to measure 3" out from the the corner and draw a square. Measure at  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " and draw a square. Now extend the lines as shown in the diagram.






Sew on the line starting with pieces a and b right sides together- fabric will be against the feed dogs and you'll be sewing with the paper facing up. Flip the paper over, unfold b from a, and lay c face down and flip paper over again and sew. Repeat in sequence.
