

3/4y for frame, cut 2 pieces, 18X22"
3/4y for background, cut 2 pieces
16x21"

1/4y for flower

1/4y for stem

1/4y for binding

Batting: low loft, 2 pieces 18x22",

2 pieces 9x18"

Other:

- -1 spool Kreinik Heavy (#32) braid or something similar.
- -Large eyed needle to accommodate heavy braid.
- -30 beads with hole large enough for braid (9 and 12 mm)
- -1 button or bead for flower center.
- -Sobo fabric glue and toothpicks.
- -Rotary cutter (new blade), mat and rulers.
- -Fabric and paper scissors.
- -Freezer paper.
- -Sewing machine and supplies.
- -Iron and ironing board (share)
- -Thread to match fabric, monofilament and neutral color bobbin thread.
- -Pins and seam ripper.
- -Optional 1/2" Fastturn tube.


Blanche's workshop will be a kind of Dresden plate pattern she has come up with. She uses a template but I am willing to bet it will be a breeze to do.







GETTING TO KNOW US...

Carol Barringer arrived in Santa
Barbara in 1990 from New Hampshire. She
has graduated from the University of New
Hampshire with a B.A. in Sociology. At UNH,
she had designed her own major in Women's
Studies. Since then, the University now
offers that major, based on her design. Carol
applied to several universities for her
graduate studies, and was accepted by ten.
Because she was seriously disabled, she
needed a warmer climate, and a fellowship
as she wasn't able to work. UCSB was one
of the two who offered her both.

As most remember, 1990 was the year of the Painted Cave fire, and she wasn't sure there would be a university to attend. Fortunately, there was and she received a masters in Social Psychology. Her thesis was on the Process of Healing from Childhood Sexual Abuse, and at 321 pages, was the longest ever presented in the Dept. of Sociology.

At the moment, Carol is on a medical leave of absence from her PhD program, and is quilting and doll making. Carol was taught quilting by a friend in New Hampshire in 1979. The friend taught her how to draft the patterns, and how to make the templates from cardboard. She says if the rotary cutter was around, she certainly didn't know about it! Her first project was a king sized, hand pieced star sampler. The project needed 30 stars to complete, but when she finished 29, she divorced her husband. Now twelve of those stars are in a quilt owned by her son. The others are part of a top, and will stay that way for awhile.

She took classes with Maggie, and joined the Guild after attending the 2nd

Natural Impressions show, which was held at the Museum of Natural History.

Carol won a red ribbon at the '98 Ojai show for a water color rose garden, which was given to, and now hangs in the office of Dr. Cynthia Bowers of UCSB Student Health Services. In '99 she won a red ribbon for a radiant 9 patch, and a blue ribbon for a bargello landscape.

Carol enjoys gardening, doll making as well as quilting. She won a blue ribbon at the State Fair for her story teller doll, which is of the Native American tradition.

Carol's vision of the future of our Guild would be for us to increase our commitment to the community to spread the joy that quilting brings us as widely as possible. Hear, hear!


We have purchased a two-year subscription to "Quilter's Newsletter" for the Santa Barbara Public Library since they have no quilting magazines. They are quite grateful.





The Recipe Corner

St.-Patrick's Day artichoke Soup



1 1/2 pound canned artichokes, 1 leek (white part only), 1 onion, 2tbs butter, 2tbs flour, 6 c. chicken broth, 1c heavy cream (or milk), salt and pepper.

Strain and cut the artichokes and cook in melted butter for 8 min along with the chopped leek and onion. Add flour and mix well for one min. Add the chicken stock, season and cook for 30 min. Liquefy in the blender. Put back into the pot and add the cream or milk . Boil for 5 min. Serve garnished

with small tomato dice.

SPRING CLEANING

Is your bag or box of fabric scraps overflowing with those pieces too small to keep with your yardage and too large to throw away? Clean out your scrap bag this month with an easy block that's sure to please. The diverse colors and prints in each block will tie together harmoniously when combined with black.

MATERIALS: -scraps of various colors and sizes


-two 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares of solid black (or "reads as black") fabric

-a 10" square of muslin to use as a foundation

Using a pencil and ruler, draw diagonal lines on the muslin foundation from the midpoints of each side of the square. Turn the muslin over and draw the same lines on the other side (for reference).



Now take two scrap pieces, right sides together, and place in the center of the muslin square. Sew a line down the edge of the pieces (with about $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance- no need to be precise). Press open so that right sides are visible. Take the next scrap and place it right side down so that it covers the raw edges of both previously sewn pieces and their seam (see diagram). Sew a line of stitching about $\frac{1}{4}$ " in from the raw edge. Press open and repeat the process, each time "catching" raw edges and seam allowance from the pieces already in place and pressed open. Starting from the center, you'll quickly work your way to the diagonal lines. Don't worry that you've covered them unevenly as long as you've covered them completely.



Place a black triangle right side down (if it has a right side) on the crazy-pieced portion as shown. Pin the triangle in place so that you can flip the muslin over to the side without piecing (pencil lines are visible). Stitch $\frac{1}{2}$ inside the pencil lines. Flip the muslin over to the right side and press open. Repeat for remaining three triangles. Since we started with larger than required triangles, we have built in a flip-and-sew "fudge factor", and the excess black fabric should be trimmed away using the muslin foundation as a guide. Final block size is 10" X10" (9 $\frac{1}{2}$ " X 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ " finished).

Challenge: Make your block glow by using scraps with bright, pure hues or subtle pastel colors, both of which will play off of the black and create sparkle!
