We were privileged to be the first to display her magnificent Baltimore Album Quilt "Nature's Splendors" in our show "Natural Impressions II". It went on to receive national awards. She is the cocreator (with Zena Thorpe) of the California Sesquicentennial Quilt which is traveling through the state before being permanently installed in Sacramento. More than a few of our Guild worked on this quilt, as well as many other quilters throughout the state.

Ellen is one of the finest appliqué artists in America today.

Her class is designed to allow each student to create her own appliqué country garden. A pattern with a selection of flowers and creatures will be provided.

During the workshop, different techniques of freezer with paper needleturn; sharp points; fine stems; and various embroidery stitches will demonstrated. The use of color to create a realistic look will be explored.



Jan Benkert gave us SENSATIONAL STARS by Gail Garber which teaches you to draft you own star designs. There are patterns and a gallery of star quilts in case you are inspired to make one of the quilts featured. Most are sampler style; some are quite inventive.

Maureen Kampen has enriched the library with Singer's QUILTING BY MACHINE. It has the clearest and most prolific instructional photographs I have seen. It makes you KNOW you can do

just as well!

Because of our doll makers, we have had three books on dolls and doll clothes given to us. DOLL CLOTHES PATTERN BOOK by Roselyn Gadia-Smitey clothes dolls from 12" to 19" and from fashion dolls to baby dolls. TWO-HOUR DOLLS' CLOTHES by Anita Louise Crane has patterns that fit 12" to 18" dolls. And if you really want to get serious, take a look at DRESSING DOLLS by Susan York. Her creations compete with the finest work you have seen in quilts. Inset lace, ribbon tucks, exquisite embroidery, tiny fabrics result in heirloom quality. Her patterns fit 16" to 20" dolls. Though she has American Girls dolls in her collection of 20 dolls, she designs for dolls that can be played with by She says, "I think of younger girls. heirloom as that Victorian, early 1900s, fantasy kind of look, something our great grandmothers might have worn. Heirloom sewing is not really a technique per se, it is more to do with the fabrics and supplies you use-the finer laces and trims and ribbons. It is a delicate kind of art." 
Block of the Month – December

YEAR 2000 FUTURE PROGRAMS




