Selected as one of the most influential quiltmakers in the world by Nihon Vogue, publisher of 88 Leaders in the Quilt World Today, Roberta Horton is one of the most well-respected quilt teachers of our era.

### SATURDAY APRIL 15 WORKSHOP WITH ROBERTA HORTON



Great American Scrap Quilt

Many of the most intriguing antique quilts were made from scraps. With the wide availability of fabric today,

many quilters have never explored the design possibilities fostered by working with small amounts of seemingly unrelated fabrics. In this class, we will experiment with different ways of using scraps to give excitement to quilts.

## attention toppers

If you have quilt tops, in any stage of completion, please consider donating them to the Community Quilts Project. It would be very helpful if you provided the backing and batting, but it is not manditory.

### GREEN CHARM EXCHANGE

In June we will once again have a popular charm exchange. This is a compiling of 5-inch squares of five different fabric in one color to exchange with other participants. You must sign up for the exchange so that we are assured that each participant will receive an equal share of charms.

Here are the rules:

- 1) Sign up at the library table in April and May. You will be given a number.
- 2) Cut exactly 5-inch squares of quality cotton, pre-washed, from any range and value of GREEN fabric.
- 3) Tack the squares together in one corner with your number attached.
- 4) In May you will be notified when the sign-up closes how many participants we have.
- 5) In June bring your squares to be lined up with the squares of other participants in piles. You will pick up charms 5 times the number of participants. For instance, if we have 40 quilters signed up, you will receive 200 squares. It's fun and you will be delighted with the variety greens that will be your own.

## Q and T from the Unknown Quilter

TUBULAR SURGICAL GAUZE

Is your thread storage area a jumbled mess of tangled threads? You can fix that with tubular surgical gauze, which is available at pharmacies. Cut the gauze into short lengths about the height of your spools. Open the tube and slip it over your spools of threads and say goodby to jumbled threads!



Supply List for I'll Show you Mine if You Show me Yours with Roberta Horton.

- 1. Special challenge fabric (cotton only): ones that have proven hard to use. Also some that aren't so unusual, but never seem to fit in.
- 2. 2–25 pieces of normal fabric (12" square minimum) representative of your fabric collection. These fabrics should NOT go together. Try to have as much variety as possible: a range of colors; dark, medium and light values; small, medium and large scale prints; florals, geometrics, textures, plaids and stripes.
- 3. Several sheets of white paper.
- 4. I yard Pellon fleece, Thermolamb, flannelette (40") or felt.
- 5. Push pins, masking tape, sewing pins.

- Calico and Beyond by Roberta Horton.





One for the Money: (\$29.95!) What an excellent book! Hanne Vibeke de Konig-Stapel dispels the three myths that silk is expensive and hard to find, silk is fragile and delicate, and silk is difficult to work with because it is slippery and ravels easily. Take a look at the lustrous quilts in this book, some combined with cotton, many silks fused, and a glossary of innumerable kinds of silk, threads, and sources (Britex in San Francisco, Thai Silks in Los Altos, Japanese silks.) Hanne's very readable first chapters on the history of silk lead to clear precise chapters on contemporary silk quilts and how to work with silk with accounts of her experiences. You will have acquired a lot of knowledge and incentive to try silk yourself!

Two Show: **SMALL-SCALE** for the QUILTMAKING by Sally Collins and SMALL WONDERS by Elizabeth Hamby Carlson. These two join other books in the library on miniature quilts to prepare us for our challenge postcard quilts due in the fall. Sally Collins focuses on precision workmanship. "Design full-scale and sew small." Elizabeth Carlson offers us 12 petite wall guilts using traditional designs of patchwork and applique, sharpening our precise patchwork skills and invisible applique stitches skills. The beauty of the gallery of quilts in both books make the challenge of "small" enticing and seemingly attainable!

Three to Get Ready: FABRIC COLLAGE QUILTS by Joanne Goldstein was sent to us by That Patchwork Place and gives us instructions in applying fabrics on fabric so that we end up with broiderie perses on

traditionally pieced backgrounds-hence "collage quilts." These are fabric pictures using fusible applique, embroidery, ribbons, and other embellishments. Templates for two of the many quilt ideas are included.

Four to Go: NEEDLE AND NOTIONS. I couldn't resist this charming book of paper-pieced patterns with a sewing room theme by Jaynette Huff. Full-size patterns for each of 13 blocks of sewing machines, thimbles, scissors, rippers, rotary cutters, needles, pin cushions, spools, irons, button jars, tea cups, measuring tapes, and even Sunbonnet Sue working on her latest quilt make it easy to want to complete a quilt using some of these blocks. Go do it!

## Information

This exhibit is a members' showcase, providing an opportunity for everyone to display their newest, best, or favorite quilt(s) at a large show. The committee urges each and every member of the Guild to submit one or more entries to this event.

Submit your written entry(ies) as soon as possible. It's not too early to reserve your place on the wall. Your quilt(s) can be currently unfinished or in process but must be completed by collection time. Every member of Coastal Quilters Guild is assured of the display of at least one quilt. Exhibit space permitting, additional quilts will be selected by lottery according to size. Please indicate the priority of the submitted entry; every effort will be made to honor your priority. Please attach a color photograph of your quilt to your entry form.

For purposes of this show, a quilt is defined as a fabric construction consisting of a front, filler layer, and back held together with stitching and made by the member-exhibitor. Cheater panels, tied quilts, and entries made from kits will not be accepted. Quilts may not have been hung at a previous CQG exhibit.

Security Arrangements: Every effort will be made to protect all quilts. Accounting and surveillance will be strictly planned and maintained. Eating and smoking are prohibited in the exhibit hall. Responsible white-gloved hostesses will try to keep all quilts in view at all times and will discourage touching by viewers. However, CQG show insurance does not cover the quilts. Each owner is responsible for insuring her own quilt(s) for loss and damage.

Label: An identifying label should be sewn securely to the quilt on the back of the lower right side stating the quilter's name, address, telephone number, and name of quilt.

Sleeve: A 4" sleeve must be attached to the back top. This provides a safe and secure means of hanging the quilt. Quilts without sleeves will not be exhibited. Sleeve construction: Cut fabric 9" by the width of the quilt less 2". Stitch a narrow hem on each end of the strip. Fold the strip in half lengthwise and stitch a 1/2" seam on the right side of the fabric, creating a long tube. Press the tube flat. Hand-stitch the top and bottom of the sleeve across the entire width of the quilt. Be sure the sleeve ends remain open for insertion of the hanging rod. Your finished tube will be approximately 4" to 4-1/2" wide.

Packaging: Each quilt should be delivered in its own pillow case with the maker's name marked in indelible ink in large letters on the hem. This will help keep the quilt clean and facilitate transport.

Details on quilt collection will be provided by September 1st.
