CIRCLE OF STARS

A workshop with Sally Collins

Date: June 9

Time 9:AM to 3:30 PM

Place: Goleta Valley Community

Center

5679 Hollister Avenue, Goleta CA

The design for this workshop was developed on a square grid. Within that grid some of the squares are split into 4 triangles and the stars emerge. The primary focus of this class is precision sewing relative to an Ohio Star. Secondary will be an explanation and discussion of color, value, contrast and visual texture when choosing fabric.

FABRIC- 100% cotton - the amount is small so bring your fabric uncut if you are pulling off your shelf or 1/8 yard pieces if you are collecting.

If you are interested in composing and designing, one way to approach this project would be to choose two colors and an accent color. Bring a variety (5–15) of values and visual textures for each color. Include a hot or intense color as well as deep darks. The skeleton design of this project could be thought of as a Trip Around the World design if that helps you to think about your fabrics. Tone on tone style fabrics work well, keeping in mind visual textures. Bring some multi-colored prints if

you have them. To help interview your fabrics, cut a 1/2" square from a 3x5 card and lay it on fabric to see how they will look cut small.

For those wanting to focus on more precision sewing, bring four solids that you like and contrast from each other.

TOOLS- Sewing machine with a new needle. We will sew with a 1/4" seam allowance so if your machine has an appropriate foot please bring it. It is also helpful to bring the machine you are most familiar with. Note book and pencil, small scissors, 10" square of flannel covered cardboard layout your work, long, fine pins (13/8"x50mm), seam ripper, rotary cutter, mat and ruler (I use a 3"x18" Omni Grid with a 1/8"grid) and a 4" square Omni Grid with a 1/8" grid. A 45 degree angle line is necessary, two small mirrors (3x5) taped together are critical if you are designing and any other sewing supplies or tools you normally use. Tweezers are optional.

Guild workshop fee is \$30. Plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up and be ready to start the workshop on time. Bring a snack to share and a prepared lunch or lunch money. Coffee and decaf, as well as an assortment of teas are supplied by the Guild.

SO CHARMING!

Remember the rules:

- 1. Cut 5-inch squares from five different fabrics in all shades of green, print or solids. Select pre-washed, 100% cottons.
- 2. Tack five different squares together in the corner and attach the number you will be given when you sign up.
- 3. Bring the squares to the June meeting and line them up with the squares of the other participants. You will pick up one pack from each pile and end up with multiple beautiful charms!

Note: You can cut 24 five-inch charms from a 1/2 yard and 12 five-inch charms from a fat quarter.


It's Heavenly!


I MADONNARI

Finally, whether you're a new member, or a veteran of the guild (and perhaps of the last show) if you see a job you'd like to be involved in, call the committee chair even if it appears the committee is full!

III. Do you have a flair for color? Do you enjoy playing with paint samples? Rearranging furniture? Color-coordinating a wardrobe or, for that matter, organizing your closet? Have you ever had a business requiring the artful arrangement of merchandise? Do you have a camera and enjoy taking color snapshots? If so, please consider the DESIGN committee!

Are you sympathetic toward the 'directionally challenged?' Do you like making signs and banners on your home computer? Do you have a good pair of walking shoes and a gofor-it! attitude? Then please consider the PUBLICITY SIGNAGE committee. Let's face it: the show may be taking place right off the freeway, but there are still folks who A) Won't be coming to the show via 101 B) Will be driving too fast to read the sign on the marquee or C) Just need that little extra push. This committee will work closely with Monte

Farris's Publicity Committee and will also need to discuss options with the Earl Warren management.

Do you have a strong belief in the educational mission of the Coastal Quilters Guild? Are you good at getting to the point via displays/short demonstrations etc.? Then think about the EDUCATION committee. Myself....I think this is one of the most important jobs in the show.

IV. Boutique. Under Nola Ferguson's leadership, the boutique should be an even greater success this year than in 1998. One decision made in planning meetings has been to ask members planning to sell items to concentrate on smaller things. In this way, we'll be able to display quilted items to their best advantage. If you have any questions, do call Nola.

The quiltmaking talents of the guild membership are wonderfully varied, as any of us can see from Show and Tell each month. I'm enormously excited to see what will be submitted--although, as I said a couple of months ago, when it comes to bed-sized quilts, you might think twin or full rather than King! Space will be at a premium in this show. I'm very pleased that we'll be able to display Wearable Art and Dolls, as those items each represent a different dimension of the talents in the guild. Again, because of space, we anticipate tucking the clothing and the dolls in amongst the quilts, the clothing on stands manufactured for the show in 1998 and the dolls perhaps on small pedestals.

Some of you may be thinking...'if space is such a problem, why didn't we go with a bigger one?' Two reasons: the first is that the larger space at Earl Warren Showgrounds is neither well-lighted nor air-conditioned; the second had to do with the dates that were available, based on events already scheduled in Earl Warren and quilt shows already scheduled in Southern California. While the decision to have the show was made a little over a year in

advance, that was still not sufficient to research other locations. Perhaps a task for next time.....

Each member may submit up to three items in each catagory, but can expect to have displayed only ONE. In cases where a member submits more than one, the display committee might decide to go with the second or third choice in order to show the quilt (etc.) to it's best advantage. While the design and exhibiting committees will arrange photograph quilts, if you can submit a photo with your application--even if it's a work-inprogress--it will certainly make their jobs a little easier! Please be accurate in your measurements. Be aware that while the guilts themselves won't be collected until perhaps a week before the show, you must submit your entry form by the deadline!

Applique gets its due this month. Besides the good applique books we have in the library already, here are a few more inspired by Melody Boolay and her wonderful Baltimore Album class. Melody turned us on to LAVISH LEGACIES from the Maryland Historical Society. Written by Jennifer Faulds Goldborough it chronicles the history of the Baltimore Albums quilts and presents enough photographs in color of quilts in the collection to satisfy any Baltimore Album fan.

bought Volume IV Next. we Elly in Sienkiewicz's Baltimore Beauties and Beyond series, 12 APPLIQUE BORDERS AND MEDALLIONS. We have all but Vol.II (which is out of print) in the series. The book contains favorite border patterns: vines with fruit and flowers, swags tied in various ways, flowersprigged borders and feather-plume borders -all full-sized patterns. Included also are two pull-out patterns for authentic medallions from two of the historic quilts. This is not a beginner's book and is best suited to those who have taken Melody's class or are already into Baltimore Album quilts.

PATCHWORK QUILT TSUSHIN, a Japanese magazine in Japanese, the size of our usual quilt books, features Baltimore Album quilts but is not limited to them. Oh to read Japanese! But if we can't, we can get great ideas from the beautiful quilts shown and actually follow the pictorial instructions for projects. There is even Japanese Sunbonnet Sue. It is interesting to see how enthusiastically Japanese have so embraced the American quilt.

A single quilt, an offspring of Baltimore Album quilts is Gems of Summer by Emily G. Senuta. She has written BLOOMS AND BASKETS; GEMS OF SUMMER which contains her 12 baskets of flowers on 12 1/2 inch blocks set on point. The appliqued flowers are quite realistic and the baskets more contemporary. Full-size pattern pull-outs for wild rose corner garlands and a flower wreath are in the back of the book. All the designs and many examples of unusual arrangements and uses of these designs are included.

And for those of you not thinking Baltimore, here is one more: BEYOND CHARMS QUILTS; THE ULTIMATE CHALLENGE by Catherine McIntee and Tammy Porath. This book is more about challenge than charms. Charm squares do inspire creativity but the ideas that grew from these two women to use up all the fabric in master sets of 100 charms really stirred their creative juices. Just reading this book will make you realize that If you gather charms together and consider what you can do with them, you are prodded to go from there to designing. Who ever thought that insignificant little squares were so powerful?

Happy Mother's Day to all of us who are mothers! There are several mothers and daughters who are members of our guild: Harriet Berk & Carol Boyce, Evelyn & Judy Gorrindo, Karin & Elisabeth Cooper, and our features of the month, Isabel Downs & Olivia Warner.

Isabel was born in Mexico City, and lived there until she was four years old. From there the family moved to Trinidad for nine years. At age thirteen they moved to New Haven, CT, where she graduated from high school at age fifteen. She feels that her parents were very wise in keeping her from enrolling in college until she was seventeen. At that point, she enrolled in Goucher College in Baltimore, where she was graduated with a degree in chemistry. She went on to receive a master's in marine biology at Scripps, and there she met her future husband, Robert Warner.

Once in the working world, she was appalled at the attitudes towards women in her chosen field, and became thoroughly disenchanted. So, of course, she went back to school, and obtained another master's, and a PhD in French! Isabel has been a scientific illustrator for the Smithsonian and has taught French and science.

One of Oliviais quilts was published in this month's edition of the Quilter's Newsletter Magazine. She loves textiles and has taken three quarters of "Fashion in Fabric" at the Ridley Tree Center, and is learning how to design and make her own patterns. Olivia also loves gymnastics, and her rabbit, who is named "Attila the Bun". Like her mother, she is truly becoming a "woman for all seasons".

Information

This exhibit is a members' showcase, providing an opportunity for everyone to display their newest, best, or favorite quilt(s) at a large show. The committee urges each and every member of the Guild to submit one or more entries to this event.

Submit your written entry(ies) as soon as possible. It's not too early to reserve your place on the wall. Your quilt(s) can be currently unfinished or in process but must be completed by collection time. Every member of Coastal Quilters Guild is assured of the display of at least one quilt. Exhibit space permitting, additional quilts will be selected by lottery according to size. Please indicate the priority of the submitted entry; every effort will be made to honor your priority. Please attach a color photograph of your quilt to your entry form.

For purposes of this show, a quilt is defined as a fabric construction consisting of a front, filler layer, and back held together with stitching and made by the member-exhibitor. Cheater panels, tied quilts, and entries made from kits will not be accepted. Quilts may not have been hung at a previous CQG exhibit.

Security Arrangements: Every effort will be made to protect all quilts. Accounting and surveillance will be strictly planned and maintained. Eating and smoking are prohibited in the exhibit hall. Responsible white-gloved hostesses will try to keep all quilts in view at all times and will discourage touching by viewers. However, CQG show insurance does not cover the quilts. Each owner is responsible for insuring her own quilt(s) for loss and damage.

Label: An identifying label should be sewn securely to the quilt on the back of the lower right side stating the quilter's name, address, telephone number, and name of quilt.

Sleeve: A 4" sleeve must be attached to the back top. This provides a safe and secure means of hanging the quilt. Quilts without sleeves will not be exhibited. Sleeve construction: Cut fabric 9" by the width of the quilt less 2". Stitch a narrow hem on each end of the strip. Fold the strip in half lengthwise and stitch a 1/2" seam on the right side of the fabric, creating a long tube. Press the tube flat. Hand-stitch the top and bottom of the sleeve across the entire width of the quilt. Be sure the sleeve ends remain open for insertion of the hanging rod. Your finished tube will be approximately 4" to 4-1/2" wide.

Packaging: Each quilt should be delivered in its own pillow case with the maker's name marked in indelible ink in large letters on the hem. This will help keep the quilt clean and facilitate transport.

Details on quilt collection will be provided by September 1st.



Evening Star - Finished 12"

Colors: White Background
Medium Bright for Star

Dark Bright Contrast for Pinwheel



Using your favorite way, make four (4) half square triangle squares of background and pinwheel materials. They should each finish at 3". Sew the four squares together to make your center pinwheel. This center square should finish at 6". Using your favorite way, make four flying geese. The geese should have a center out of the background material. One side should be your dark bright and the other side should be your medium bright. Check the placement so that the dark bright on your goose will match the dark bright in your pinwheel. See picture. Your geese should finish at 6" x 3". Sew a goose on two opposite sides of your pinwheel, making sure to match your dark bright material. Sew a 3 ½" square of background fabric to each end of your remaining geese. Then sew these strips to your center strip. If you followed my directions and I wrote them correctly, you should now have a 12 ½" unfinished block of the month to turn in at the next guild meeting. Remember to make at least one extra square to keep for your own millennium quilt. You can place the light, medium and dark wherever you want for your own quilt square. If you have any questions or it just won't work, please check the demo at the meeting or call Lois at 563-1411 evenings or weekends.

Suggested ways for making flying geese: Connector squares; pieced triangles; two half square triangle squares sewn together.

Suggested ways for half square triangle squares: Sewing triangles together; layering two squares, sew diagonal lines on either side of center diagonal, cut apart.
