In his class we will learn how to design the pattern to best fill the space and how to make a pattern work out to fit and turn a corner. Not all of Joe's work is done with drafting tools. He encourages the use of free hand drawing to complete patterns.

As you can see from the workshop list this will be a class that does not require a lot of fancy drafting tools. A ruler and compass are as technical as it gets. The best part, though, is the opportunity to bring a quilt top for marking advice and the chance to listen to an expert plan how to quilt finished tops.





Library Corner

What to do with those beautiful white spaces We have added three books to help you. on our quilts?



Linda Macho's QUILTING PATTERNS has 100 full-size, traditional designs that are easy to transfer to a quilt by making machine perforated patterns, a stencil, or template. She gives instructions for all of these techniques.

Dorothy Osler's QUILTING DESIGN SOURCEBOOK illustrates the same methods with added discussions for appropriateness and style. Included are calculated percentages for enlargement or reduction of her library of designs, many of which are less traditional designs.

60 MACHINE QUILTING PATTERNS, by Pat Holly and Sue Nickles, begins with instructions for machine quilting: where to begin, stitching order, free-motion practice, packaging for sewing, thread and tension options, pressure feet. This book includes many border quilting patterns.

Design Tip...

Do you have a quilt block book and have trouble determining which block to make out of all your favorites? Try combining 2 blocks. For example, Turkey Tracks and Ohio Star combine nicely to create a rich visual appeal. Then use the 2 blocks by linking them with colors or designs at edges where they meet. Alternate and repeat across the quilt. Try this with any two blocks you like, for a top that is uniquely your own.

Our first redwork book is in, kindly donated by Mary Cunningham. FAVORITE REDWORK DESIGNS, by Betty Alderman, presents eight projects using that 100-year-old embroidery craze. The usual botanical, garden, tea pot, and Sunbonnet Sue designs are included as well as an alphabet in redwork. Lovely and nostalgic, the designs can be used for appliqué or quilting.

Another donation thanks to our guild member, Harriet Burke. It is our most complete book on hand-dyeing: CREATING COLOR; A DYER'S HANDBOOK, by Judy Anne Walter. This book is full of technical and practical instructions, timesaving charts, formulas, clear explanation of the process, and chemistry of dyes -- in short, everything you need to know to create magical hand-dyed fabrics at home using simple household equipment.

If you have avoided making a quilt set on point because you were afraid of the math, fear not. Check out Trudie Hughes' ON POINT. She shows you how to accurately measure and machine piece groups of blocks, different width rows, and pieced borders set diagonally. Her instructions are clear and give you confidence! The secret of your beautifully flat and perfectly pieced quilt will be that you followed her many instructions, hints and admonitions to the letter. Seventeen projects are included.





Memorial Day weekend was the 14th year for I Madonnari, the Italian Street Painting Festival that helps support the Children's Creative Project, a nonprofit arts education program of the County Education Office. The project sponsors fine arts programs in the schools for a total of 66,000 children. Coastal Quilters participated this year for the first time. Marlene Pearson, a member of our guild, has been quilting for twentythree years and has a background in mural art. She also did the chalking in red, white and blue with the help of 3 high school students and an experienced artist. The result was a beautiful quilt design, a combination of Shoo-Fly and Bird of Paradise blocks. She was influenced by Joan Wolfrom's recent workshop, "Marriage of Blocks." It was a wonderful opportunity for the community at large to become aware of our guild as many viewers commented on their connections to quilts. A visitor from England stopped by and introduced herself as a quilter. The kinship of quilters is truely international.



Harvest of Colors Update

Oh, my goodness! June is upon us! What does this mean for the quilt show? Well, It means that all guild members have another 6 weeks to decide which beautiful item to submit for the show - because based on Show and tell. we all do beautiful work, whether beginners or experts; whether working in a traditional or contemporary style. I encourage every single guild member to participate by show a guilt. a doll or wearable and by volunteering. Do keep in mind that you need not make something especially for the show. I for one have chosen an already-finished project, work and other things being what they are this summer. A crib quilt, and I don't think my nephew would appreciate having his quilt taken from him. Here's the latest from the organizational front. I still need one or two members for the DESIGN committee. If you are interested in participating in the BOUTIQUE, make a little money for yourself as well as for the guild, please talk to Nola Ferguson.

The ACQUISITIONS committees, all three, quilts, wearable art and dolls, strongly encourage members to get their applications in early and with a photograph. The item need not be finished, you have until September for that. Dollmakers, your submission form will be available very soon.

Some months ago, Ranell issued a challenge to Satellite Groups to volunteer for the show - here's what we need:

EDUCATION has three components: Poster displays, handouts, and informal talks. For example, at a show, Ranell saw a display having to do with quilt batting. There were

small pieces each using a different batting, either machine quilted or hand quilted. Is there a group that would like to take on that display?

Handouts: on various topics such as quilt care, both new and antique, techniques, etc. Why not research a particular question and share the information with the guild and visitors to our show? Informal talks by quilters and quilting professionals in our guild. We invite you to volunteer, to prepare handouts, make a poster or consider a short presentation. If you are interested, call me and we can discuss it. We need to keep track of these events, in brief, we need an Educational Chair.

Publicity signage is a new endeavor. It's simple. A group is needed to take charge of making and posting signs and flyers the weekend of the show. I'm talking about the kind of posting folks do for garage sales, on a slightly larger scale. Many hands can take on the job of making and distributing signs

Call For Quilts — Member's Showcase

Our second semi-annual Guild quilt show is scheduled for October 13-15 at Earl Warren. As before, our primary objective is to provide a showcase for members' work--all our members.

Our first show of this type in 1998 was a great success. And we expect to be able repeat the experience this fall. Now we know that a large number of our members had second and third entries to the last show that could not be included for lack of space. These quilts are good candidates for resubmission (AND I even have a photograph of them, sez Anne Braddock). We have also seen a steady stream of really beautiful quilts displayed over the past couple of years at Show and Tell. These are also excellent candidates.

What are your excuses for not participating? Being shy, new to the Guild, or overly critical of your own work may be some of them, but let me assure you that we really do want your quilts. This is not a juried show; all our quilts meet the standard for the show. Another excuse may be that you have given away the quilt you want to submit. Why not ask to borrow it back in order to have it in the show? Many of us have done this in the past and the quilts' owners were happy to have their quilt on view. Another excuse may be that it is not finished. The deadline for submission of quilt entries is July 15. This does not mean that your quilt has to be finished by that date; finishing can occur during the four

months that follow. But we DO need to know ABOUT your quilt (how large, what style, what colors predominate, etc.) and we need a photograph of it for the display committee. If you don't have a photograph, please bring your quilt or quilt-in-process to a Guild meeting and we will provide an amateur photographer's service. You will find an entry form in the newsletter; the application is on one side and the instructions/rules are on the other.

If you have any questions, please feel free to contact a member of the Acquisitions Committee listed on the form for clarification. Again, we hope to have a quilt from as many of our members as possible. It can be a king size quilt or it can be a miniature, or any size in between.

Information

This exhibit is a members' showcase, providing an opportunity for everyone to display their newest, best, or favorite quilt(s) at a large show. The committee urges each and every member of the Guild to submit one or more entries to this event.

Submit your written entry(ies) as soon as possible. It's not too early to reserve your place on the wall. Your quilt(s) can be currently unfinished or in process but must be completed by collection time. Every member of Coastal Quilters Guild is assured of the display of at least one quilt. Exhibit space permitting, additional quilts will be selected by lottery according to size. Please indicate the priority of the submitted entry; every effort will be made to honor your priority. Please attach a color photograph of your quilt to your entry form.

For purposes of this show, a quilt is defined as a fabric construction consisting of a front, filler layer, and back held together with stitching and made by the member-exhibitor. Cheater panels, tied quilts, and entries made from kits will not be accepted. Quilts may not have been hung at a previous CQG exhibit.

Security Arrangements: Every effort will be made to protect all quilts. Accounting and surveillance will be strictly planned and maintained. Eating and smoking are prohibited in the exhibit hall. Responsible white-gloved hostesses will try to keep all quilts in view at all times and will discourage touching by viewers. However, CQG show insurance does not cover the quilts. Each owner is responsible for insuring her own quilt(s) for loss and damage.

Label: An identifying label should be sewn securely to the quilt on the back of the lower right side stating the quilter's name, address, telephone number, and name of quilt.

Sleeve: A 4 sleeve must be attached to the back top. This provides a safe and secure means of hanging the quilt. Quilts without sleeves will not be exhibited. Sleeve construction: Cut fabric 9 by the width of the quilt less 2 . Stitch a narrow hem on each end of the strip. Fold the strip in half lengthwise and stitch a 1/2 seam on the right side of the fabric, creating a long tube. Press the tube flat. Hand-stitch the top and bottom of the sleeve across the entire width of the quilt. Be sure the sleeve ends remain open for insertion of the hanging rod. Your finished tube will be approximately 4 to 4-1/2 wide.


Packaging: Each quilt should be delivered in its own pillow case with the maker's name marked in indelible ink in large letters on the hem. This will help keep the quilt clean and facilitate transport.

Details on quilt collection will be provided by September 1st.




