





# Library Corner

ne of the advantages of having a Guild library is the opportunity for members to have access to expensive quilt books they wouldn't feel justified buying for themselves. In April we bought SILK QUILTS and this month we have Jinny Beyer's DESIGNING TESSELLATIONS. Jinny, in her usual meticulous way, shows you how you can make those amazing interlocking designs that spread magically across a quilt. M.C. Escher, of course, is a primary inspiration. More than 2000 color illustrations analyze tessellating designs and Jinny walks us through.

We've also added Jinny's COLOR CONFI-DENCE FOR QUILTERS which helps show how with a master pallet you can blend any colors to create visual excitement in your quilts.

C&T Publishing has started a new series on the art and inspiration of gifted quilt artists with the first volume: ART & INSPIRATION: RUTH B. MCDOWELL. Ruth reveals in her direct and personal way how she arrived at the summit where we find her today. Many beautiful photographs and her own descriptions of her artistic process and progress lead to an understanding of her quilting philosophy.

THE BEST OF BALTIMORE BEAUTIES by Elly Sienkiewicz is now ours.

95 full-size patterns for album blocks and borders taken from her previous 15 books Are joined by some new designs. References to earlier titles for construction details pose little problem since we have a good supply of these titles. As we have come to expect, Elly's careful and deep research fills this volume with rich historical detail.

If you were at Joe Cunningham's lecture and workshops last month, you will be glad that we have QUILTING WITH STYLE: PRINCIPLES FOR GREAT PATTERN DESIGN that he has written with Gwen Marston. Whether you quilt by hand or machine, these master quilters and historians show how to draft quilting patterns, how to mark them, and how to choose and quilt designs that will fit your quilt. They emphasize that you can make quilts and quilting designs any way you want and they give you the basic knowledge to do it.

With our upcoming challenge in mind, we have purchased Valerie Hearder's charming BEYOND THE HORIZON: SMALL LANDSCAPE APPLIQUE. She introduces you to her unique method of creating miniature fabric landscapes with a "cut and collage" approach that combines hand appliqué and fusible appliqué techniques with stamping, embroidery, and beading embellishments. Checking this book out is worthwhile alone for the quotes she includes at the beginning of each chapter, the shortest of which is, "Do not fear Mistakes—there are none." Miles Davis

# Creative Input for People Who Needle

f I think too much L about creativity, off times I just draw a blank. What it is, where it is, or will ever return leads me nowhere. To define it is like looking

for a lost needle. After all, I assume we all want to be creative in our quilting or crafting. expressing our feelings outwardly in a piece of art, in any number of media forms. I joined the Guild to continue on the path of creativity. Did you? Hear it? "I want to be creative... I want to..." Perhaps, that is where we get stuck in our creativity. I don't claim to be an expert on creativity, but occasionally it even happens to me. "I did it and it is just the way it's supposed to be!" It sure makes me feel good, and then I move on to another project, challenged, refreshed and somehow renewed by the excitement of the last creative endeavor. I want to have flashes of creative inspiration again and again, it's a rush.

Meanwhile, if the next project doesn't present itself in a hot flash, dream or shower scape sans 3 cups of coffee, I've learned to comfort myself with feeding the creative store house. Build up the memory bank! That's when I pour through books, magazines, source materials on design, fabrics, ethnic rugs, from paint samples to fractal patterns in nature. There's time to dabble with watercolors, colored pencils, play with scraps of pretty origami papers, doodle, browse quilt block patterns and fabrics. Time to cozy up with books, seek wide open spaces and secret spots of beauty. Time to try new tastes, listen to different songs, take off the sun glasses, go for a walk.

Every endeavor that inspires has to come from somewhere. Those combinations of fantastic synaptic flashes, bits of sights and sounds that combine in unique ways in our brains, we call collaborative and creative expression. These combinations of exciting ways to view, hear or experience something seemingly new, yet familiar and "Oh, so interesting," are fulfilling to at least one of the senses and to the spirit. What I'm getting at here is a pep-talk for creative thrill seekers. To continue to be creative, to seek creative expression in your chosen artistic media, whether it be any form of artistic expression, paint, clay, fabric manipulation, combination of media forms culminating in quilts, wearable items, beautiful needlework. fabric sculpting and all expressions thereof. all the information you can accumulate in source material does its magic on you!

Whenever you feed your mind, beautiful images, in turn, are reflected in your art. Whenever you look for color, design, harmony, balance, texture, scale, line, subject, motif, focal point and pattern you stock your creative storehouse. More and richer creative experiences lie in your future. Sources are everywhere. Develop new ways of seeing by making time to discover the joys of entertaining beauty in all its artistic forms. Take art classes, try new media forms, visit museums, discover photography by great artists, look for beauty in every thing, feed your brain with new images that bring joy and share your enthusiasm with friends.

You will still be surprised the next time you have a creative flash, that peak of excitement that tells you 'the path is straight to your goal of pure artistic expression.' It was developing all the time, inside your own creative mind, by you and just for you, it's purpose -- to bring joy! Happiness is a hot creative thought! Lynn Laughrin-Editor

# **September Workshops**



Elly Sienkiewicz, our guest speaker for September, has been designing and making quilts, studying, writing and teaching quilt making for two dozen years. Her creativity has fueled 15 books on appliqué, both fine and folk. We are delighted that Elly's busy schedule this year includes a lecture and two workshops for Coastal Quilters Guild. Sign-ups for the September Elly Sienkiewicz workshops will begin at our July guild meeting.

The following is a brief description of both workshops. On Thursday, September 14, Elly will teach BURST INTO BLOOM-TWELVE EASY WAYS! This happy folk art project class is full-budded with appealing appliqué methods. Make a spring fresh pillow front, 'Dutch Bulbs a-Bloomin'. The pattern is from Elly's award-winning appliqué book, Appliqué 12 Easy Ways! Color it your way: Amish, water colored, homespun, 1930's---whatever. Elly shares twelve sure-fire skills including transparency appliqué, grain placement, superfine self-stuffed stems and

curvaceous edges. Even design an optional paper cut frame to border this block with cutaway appliqué. The skill level for this upbeat class is confident beginner to advanced.

On Friday, September 15, SPLENDID THEOREM APPLIQUES! will be the workshop. Apply dramatic appliqué techniques to 'Wendy's Fruit Bowl' or another fruit block from Elly's book, The Best of Baltimore Beauties. These graphic album blocks teach light source, freezer paper on top or inside, print windows for realistic fabric use, and focus on antique theorem-style fabric shading using the new oil intensive Craypas Specialist pastels. Learn how to make fruit appliqués that look like old masters. The skill level of this workshop is confident beginner to advanced. (Elly suggested this workshop when she learned that our guild has a number of experienced appliqué members, but remember, this block would make a wonderful pillow or framed wall piece for those who are not working on a Baltimore Album quilt.) 





Hello Guild Members,






# Creative Sewing Tip...

Who says borders have to be the same all around the quilt. Other factors such as design motif, color scheme, spacing, quilting, etc., can tie borders together. Experiment with piecing or applique for border designs on each one of the 4 four borders. It's a good way to use up scraps or blocks. You can unify the design, if that is your objective, with color schemes or repetitive elements. Take your creativity right out to the edges, when needs be and the spirit moves you!




