September Speaker


Our September speaker, Elly Sienkiewicz, has been designing and making quilts, studying, writing and teaching quiltmaking for over two dozen years. By 1999 her creativity and research had fueled 14 books on appliqué, both fine and folk. In 1996, Elly's Appliqué 12 Easy Ways! won the quilt industry Classics Award for best book on appliqué, and a sequel, Fancy Appliqué!, followed in 1999. Widely admired as both a needlewoman and scholar, Elly's work has fueled the recent Baltimore Album revival.

Consumed by the question of why we love quiltmaking so, Elly is a delightful teacher and inspiring lecturer. Affirming this, she has lectured at the Smithsonian Institution and across five continents. Elly says she is never happier than when she is teaching quiltmaking. That kind of enthusiasm is sure to be contagious!



Annual Book Sale -September Meeting



Quilts Sought for Important Court Case


A SEARCH is underway for a quilt made before 1990 that is either a Le Moyne star or variable star pattern using pastels, preferably solids. Of particular interest are quilts with NO sashing (stars are touching), set straight (not on point), with each star a single color. The quilt itself or pictures will do. An importer is claiming this pastel design is her copyrighted design and has taken it to court. Court date is October, 2000. If this importer wins, this creates serious problems for us as quilters as we will have limitations placed on our color choices with traditional patterns...especially if you want to sell a quilt or win prize money with your quilt. It has a further impact on opening the door to someone copyrighting all sorts of quilts made from traditional patterns. VOLUNTEERS ARE STILL NEEDED

At the September meeting, you will have your second chance to sign up for a shift as a White Glove Host, Go-fer, Ticket Seller, Opportunity Quilt Ticket seller, etc. If you can't make the meeting, call Diane Eardley, and she will get you on her list. If you volunteer, you will be given a complimentary ticket to the show for the day you work. If you don't volunteer, you will have to pay \$5 at the door just like everyone else. These are the categories of volunteers:

White Glove Host: Wearing (yes!) white gloves, you will greet the public, answer questions about quilts and quilting, lift up the quilt so that the back may be seen, and keep people from touching the quilts. This is a job requiring you to be on your feet for 2 to 2-1/2 hours.



Tickets: You will be seated at the front door, taking money and stamping hands; making sure everyone has a program, a Viewer's Choice Ballot, and a survey and ask parents who bring baby strollers to park them in the designated area.

Opportunity Quilt: Sit at the information table, selling opportunity quilt tickets and answering questions about the Guild, Restroom locations, etc. If you are at the info table, you are encouraged to bring some hand work, so that folks can see a little of what goes into making a quilt.

Gofer: Assist in any area. You will be provided with a spiffy hand-dyed yellow apron (BBQ-style) so that are easy to spot. You can expect to be on your feet.

Hang the show: This job is on Friday, October 13, from about 1-5 PM. Under the direction of the Exhibit and the Design committees, you will hang the quilts.

Take down the show: This job is on Sunday, October 15, from about 5-7:30 PM. Quilts will be taken down, returned to their wrappings and made ready for pickup by guild members.

PHOTOGRAPHING ENTRIES FOR THE SHOW

If you submitted a QUILT or DOLL for the show, we must have a PHOTO for the design committee! (Wearable Art will be placed in the show on the day the quilts are hung, so it isn't necessary to have a photo of those items.) If you did not provide a photo and you have not had one taken yet, be sure to bring your quilt or doll to the September meeting and we will get a picture then. If it is not finished--bring it anyway. The most important thing for the Design Committee is the COLOR.

DROPPING OFF AND PICKING UP YOUR SHOW ENTRIES All entries for the Quilt Show will be due on or before Monday, October 9. The Acquisition Committees will be sending out letters letting you know all the details for dropping off and picking up your entry(s).

FLYER DISTRIBUTION (Letting people know about the show) Publicity Chair MONTE FARRIS will have a sign-up sheet in September for distributing flyers to around 70 local businesses, organizations, hotels, and so forth. Let's all give Monte a hand in spreading the word about our show!

CHALLENGE QUILTS The only things not due on October 9 are the Challenge Quilts. This year's guild challenge, the postcard quilts, will be displayed, admired, etc. at the October meeting (October 12) then taken to Earl Warren to be hung for the show. Kristen Otte will be announcing all the details.

WANTED: PERSON(S) TO COORDINATE DISPLAYS IN LOCAL BUSINESSES

Monte Farris needs a person to help out with contacting local businesses to ask about setting up window or other kinds of displays advertising our show.

For this job, you will need to be able to make the calls or visits to arrange for the displays, then coordinate getting those displays done.

No Vendor Dinner this Year:

The committee voted on August 22 not to

In the two years since the last show, the minimum cost per person of having the meal catered at Earl Warren has gone up ridiculously, to the point that by the time tax and tip were added the meal would cost over \$20 per person. Moving a dinner off-site would present major logistical difficulties, and the

committee decided--regretfully--to drop the issue entirely.

YOU CAN SELL YOUR QUILT, DOLL, OR WEARABLE If you did not indicate your desire to sell on your acquisition form and have decided that you wish to, let the acquisition committee know ASAP. These sales are entirely separate from the boutique, however, as with the sales from the Boutique, the guild will receive a 10% commission.

BOUTIQUE Talk to Nola Ferguson by calling 805-684-5665 if you wish to participate. The turnout so far is terrific and we will have a brand-new configuration for the booth, making the display even better than the last show!

SECURITY: THE YELLOW APRON BRIGADE

During each shift on Saturday and Sunday, 5-6 guild members will be designated as members of the "Yellow Apron Brigade." Gofers will automatically be part of this, as will I. I will be recruiting 2-3 additional members for each shift. If you wish to volunteer, call me at 805-968-7845. Here are the general responsibilities:

In the unlikely event of an emergency-earthquake or fire, for example--the Yellow Apron Brigade will be responsible for directing people to the exits and maintaining order. The quilts will be left behind. If there's some other kind of emergency, anything from a fall, to a cut, to a heart attack to a kid who misplaces his mom, I want people at the show, whether vendors, guild members, or the general public, to be able to instantly spot someone who can provide assistance.




In November:

SATURDAY WORKSHOP

Kelly Gallagher-Abbott will be our guild speaker and workshop teacher in November. On Saturday, November 11th, Kelly will lead a one day Crazy Quilting Workshop. She will briefly discuss the history of crazy quilting and demonstrate numerous techniques from piecing to finishing. An optional materials kit for this workshop may be purchased from Kelly. The supply list and kit price will be available at the September Guild meeting.

September Workshops

Elly Sienkiewicz, our guest speaker for September, has been designing and making quilts, studying,



writing and teaching quilt making for two dozen years. Her creativity has fueled 15 books on appliqué, both fine and folk. We are delighted that Elly's busy schedule this year includes a lecture and two workshops for Coastal Quilters Guild.

The following is a brief description of both workshops. On Thursday, September 14, Elly will teach BURST INTO BLOOM-TWELVE EASY WAYS! This happy folk art project class is full-budded with appealing appliqué methods. Make a spring fresh pillow front, 'Dutch Bulbs a-Bloomin'. The pattern is from Elly's award-winning appliqué book, Appliqué 12 Easy Ways! Color it your way: Amish, water colored, homespun, 1930's--- whatever. Elly shares twelve sure-fire skills including transparency appliqué, grain

curvaceous edges. Even design an optional paper cut frame to border this block with cutaway appliqué. The skill level for this upbeat class is confident beginner to advanced.

On Friday, September 15, SPLENDID THEOREM APPLIQUES! will be the workshop. Apply dramatic appliqué techniques to 'Wendy's Fruit Bowl' or another fruit block from Elly's book. The Best of Baltimore Beauties. These graphic album blocks teach light source, freezer paper on top or inside, print windows for realistic fabric use, and focus on antique theorem-style fabric shading using the new oil intensive Craypas Specialist pastels. Learn how to make fruit appliqués that look like old masters. The skill level of this workshop is confident beginner to advanced. (Elly suggested this workshop when she learned that our guild has a number of experienced appliqué members, but remember, this block would make a wonderful pillow or framed wall piece for those who are not working on a Baltimore Album quilt.) Satellite Groups



Library Corner - New Books

A worm is a strip of fabric that is two and a half inches wide. OPEN A CAN OF WORMS by Debby Caffrey details her method of cutting strips using a square ruler such as an Omnigrid 96 and a triangle ruler such as an Omnigrid 98. Once you read her instructions you can see why the quilts keep coming from this method. It's very precise, saves lots of time, and uses up all that stash fabric you have. You'll end up with boxes or shelves of worms ready to use in the eleven patterns she includes and those that start coming to you in the middle of the night. Easy and inspiring!

Do you happen to need a rhinoceros for your quilt? How about a water buffalo? QUILTS ON SAFARI by Jenny Williamson and Pat Parker present in photographs of ten quilts and the African countryside that inspired them, the vitality of African life. The colors and designs serve as a backdrop for the love these women display for the country in which they live. Rich yellows and browns and blacks evoke the strong flavors of Africa, but misty pastels in landscape designs clearly suggest vast distances. Traditional huts, ubiquitous animals, and people playing and working are images that make these quilts especially evocative of life on the "dark continent" no longer dark.

Peaky and Spike have finally joined our guild. TRAVELS WITH PEAKY AND SPIKE, Doreen Speckman's happy cruising around the world with quilters is full of zip. Peaky is a sturdy male triangle; Spike is a winsome, elongated triangle. Together in each quilt they create marine life, flowers, and stars, but mainly fish. Wonderful whales, dolphin, and fish in beautiful carefree



designs. Doreen has passed on but her followers love the spirit she embodied of having fun on cruises. She has included practical advice for onboard life. Ifyou are a cruiser, you will enjoy this book.

Carol Doak started with the simple LeMoyne Star block and breaking it up into smaller patches created 50 FABULOUS PAPER-PIECED STARS. I think her inspiration came later to name each star after a state, but her clear paper-piecing instructions are impetus enough to check out this book. She includes a CD in the back that can be downloaded from the Internet to demonstrate her technique. The beautiful elaborate stars belie the simplicity that paper piecing provides. Thank you, Carol Doak.

As a contrast, take a look at Jinny Beyer's SOFT EDGE PIECING. "Soft edge" is really "curved" in opposition to geometric straight lines. Jinny takes the printed fabrics (mostly paisley striped) that she has used in borders and medallions and appliqués their cut-up shapes to traditional patchwork designs adding elegance and intricacy to the blocks. Her description of her decisions in creating the illustrated designs is enormously instructive and freeing to those wishing to break out of traditional design methods.

Well, that should keep you busy. Happy quilting. Joyce Ball


S ummer's over, we're back from vacation, the kids are back in school, now there's

Remember, think small, miniature, or postcard size with



Tips for Quilters

To sell your quilts and tops, mark each with a minimum price you will accept. Ask for sealed bids and the highest bidding price above yours is the buyer.

Sewing thread is twisted to be used in sewing as it comes directly from the spool. Thread the needle with that end and tie the knot at the end you cut from the spool. Thus, the left twist will not unravel, relax as much, or become weak or frayed than if you do it the other way. Thread twisted to the right is also available, reverse the order of threading and knots. Hand sew with 10"-14" of thread.

Keep an on-going idea book...include pictures, sketches, notes, pressed flowers, greeting cards, paint swatches, fashion photos from magazines, anything that inspires you for design, motif, color schemes, repetitions, etc. The sketch book will grow in time and you will find, looking back, all your favorite things inside to inspire again and again. It's also fun to see how your vision has evolved and what you still like years later.



Size: 12" Finished




This star block can be made several ways.

You can make it using 16 half square triangles **OR** 4 half square triangles and 6 flying geese.

The half square triangles should finish at 3". the flying geese should finish at 3" x 6".

Pattern pieces are not included because I think we can all draw our own squares and rectangles. I have drawn a triangle for those of you who may want to make your half square triangles by actually sewing two triangles together. This is a fairly easy block so that you can get one made even while finishing your quilt for our October show.
