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


President 2001:

ast fall, our guild's board decided to participate in the California Heritage Quilt Project's Sesquicentennial Quilt Class for fourth graders. The goal of this class is to introduce students to quilting and it's relationship to the history and geography of California. The class is based on the California Sesquicentennial Quilt that was planned by Ellen Heck and Zena Thorpe in honor of California's 150th birthday celebration last year. Several Santa Barbara quilters designed and worked on portions of this spectacular quilt that now hangs in our state's capitol.

The quilt class integrates quilting with California history. There is a slide show on the Sesquicentennial quilt followed by hands-on activities. Each student will stitch on a special children's quilt. After the children have quilted, they will sign their name on the quilt so they, too, will be part of the celebration. The first classes are being scheduled for late January at Monroe school, and the project will continue over the next couple of years. There will be flyers about the classroom project available at the January guild meeting to share with your local elementary school.

Exciting Workshops This Month

January Ruth McDowell

Due to a rare gap in her travel schedule, Ruth McDowell will be able to stay in Santa Barbara an extra day to teach a one day Planning for Piecing workshop on Saturday, January 13, 2001. From one of the expert machine piecers of the world, author of the Piecing book, C&T Publishing, 1998, learn some tricks to enhance your own pieced designs. We will look at the piecing of traditional blocks, and designing original blocks. Examples of blocks adapted from freehand sketches will be discussed, and some solutions to technically complicated constructions explored. After the introductory session, the students will have an opportunity to practice some of the construction techniques introduced, and to plan and begin to construct a quilt or wall hanging of an original design of their own, either as a repeated block pattern or uniquely pieced quilt.

Pieced Flowers Class (2 days, Thursday and Friday) Enlarge one of the patterns in Pieced Flowers, (C&T Publishing, 2000) to at least the size recommended and bring it to class prepared to sew a block (or blocks) Review the material on pages 9-11 and 109-112 before class.

Supplies: paper scissors, freezer paper, sewing kit (includes skinny pins), highlighters (2 different colors), clear ruler, fabric scissors, colored pencils for marking a variety of fabrics, notebook, masking tape, fineline permanent marker, eraser, sewing machine, ziploc bag, rotary cutter and small mat.

Optional: Fleece or board to pin up work in progress, template material (if making 8 or more of the same block), 1/8-inch paper punch if making plastic templates, sandpaper.

Fabric: a selection of fabrics for your project. Ruth suggests a variety--small, medium and large scale prints, plaids, solids or hand-dyes, unusual fabrics. Scraps, fat quarters or half yards of many fabrics rather than larger pieces of just a few. Yardage required will vary with the scale of the project you choose.

ADDITIONAL CLASS: Planning for piecing (Saturday) Call Joann Conklin (967-0095) to sign-up. This is a class all on paper covering the methods Ruth uses for planning her pieced quilts. She'll discuss adapting traditional piecing in your own freehand designs, repeated geometrically-based blocks, and how to solve technically complicate construction. Supplies required are very simple. Call Joann for information about what to bring.

Lecture: "So Old It's New"

Thursday, February 8

Workshops: "Liberated Block Construction" Friday, February 9 and "The Surprise Quilt" Saturday, February 10 "So Old It's New Old quilts have been Gwen's teachers. They are full of little-used ideas for today's quilters. In this lecture, she will show us as sampling of quilts and talk about how she uses old ideas to create new quilts. This talk is filled with information and tips on how to study old quilts to find new ideas.

About Gwen:

Gwen Marston is a professional quiltmaker who gives workshops and lectures across the country. She has written six books and co-authored seven! Since 1983, Gwen has lived on Beaver Island, Michigan, the most remote inhabited island in the Great Lakes. There she is inspired by a beautiful natural harbor, beaches, woods, wildlife and lots of old quilts. She conducts retreats on the island each fall.

About the Liberated Block Friday class: This class is based on Gwen's method for making olks style scrap quilts. Quilters learn my new techniques of free-piecing original blocks based on traditional ideas. Fun and easy for all skill levels. Should be able to complete at least one small quilt top.


Supplies for Liberated Block Construction class: Sewing machine and basic sewing kit Rotary cutter and 6-inch ruler. Fabrics: This is a scrap class, so bring a wide assortment of scraps. Small pieces will work. Solids, prints or a combination of both work equally well.


4 Lattice/borders: 1/2 yard

About the Surprise Quilt Saturday class. From this one day workshop, each quilter should take home a nearly complete quilt top. The workshop demonstrates how Gwen allows a quilt to "design itself" and answers all the questions she gets about how she works in the scrap style.

Supplies for the Surprise Quilt class:

1 Large paper grocery sack
Sewing machine
Template material (optional)
Pencil, paper, ruler
Fabric scissors or rotary cutter
30 strips of 100% cotton fabric,
1-1/2" x 45" (or width of fabric),
all different if possible. Set and borders:
2 yards of a favorite background fabric,
something you like.

Library News

othing hot off the press this month, but quilts centuries old and their admirers are not bothered by that! Two donations to the library come to mind. CHINTZ QUILTS; UNFADING GLORY by Lacy Folmar and Betty Jo Shiell presents treasured chintz quilts from the Shelburne Museum in Vermont and the Charleston Museum in South Carolina. The history and romance of chintz textiles is here as well as examples of wholecloth, appliquéd, album and patchwork chintz quilts-and there are a few contemporary ones.

The second book, QUILTS OF PROVENCE by Kathryn Berenson is lush with the fine art of French quilting that evolved from their intricate needlework. The typical Provence quilt has the detailed designs that show up in the popular mattelasse spreads offered in catalogs today. But these quilts were hand quilted and often stuffed for a trapunto effect. Provencal colors and patterns shown are very much in the Wm. Sonoma scene today.


We have added a much needed BARGELLO QUILTS by Margie Edie. Inspired by a traditional needlepoint stitch, bargello quilts not only capitalize on startling design achieved by color value in

the many fabrics used, but also can magically produce a landscape as has been learned in some of Nora Meeking's classes.

Sewing Machines Problems

Unplug your machine during cleaning and oiling. A flashlight will help you see into the dark areas.

20% of all sewing machine problems are cleaning problems. Use a small lint brush, soft cloth, q-tip and toothpick to remove lint from the hook area, between feed dog teeth, under the bobbin case. Look for thread caught in the bobbin mechanism, tension disks and in tension spring. Avoid pushing lint farther into the machine; try to extract it with tweezers if needed.

10% are lubrication problems - too little, too much or incorrect oiling. Use a Brand Name sewing machine oil. All purpose oil gums up the machine gears. Clear oil is preferable over yellow sewing machine oil as many machines have plastic cases which will discolor with yellow oil. Most sewing machines are damaged by too much oil rather than too little oil. When oil gets into the motor or on rubber belts, get the check book, it could get rather expensive. Nothing can turn a \$50 repair into a \$200 repair faster than a can of oil. To oil your machine, turn the hand wheel, look for moving parts and use only a tiny drop of oil any place where two pieces of metal are rubbing

together. Use a tube-type oiler, not the oil can, it can reach into tight places and releases less oil.



20% of sewing machine problems are thread or threading problems. Avoid old or cheap thread. Use quality thread. Most (not all) low priced threads have

thick and thin areas, thus making it impossible to regulate thread tension. The dye used in dark colored thread offers more resistance to tension. Don't believe it? Try using black on top and white in the bobbin. Double-check tensions when changing from white to dark threads. Machines with automatic tension adjustments are supposed to adjust for you. Double check anyway.

Having trouble with seams puckering? Check bobbin and top thread tension, the thread should pull from the machine, when pulled together, at the same tension. Tension adjustments and/or lengthening the stitch could give you a better seam.





Interesting Water Facts

Lack of water is the #1 trigger of daytime fatigue.

8-10 glasses of water a day could significantly ease back and joint pain of sufferers.

Things We Can Learn From a Dog


- Never pass up the opportunity to go for a joyride.

Sensory Activity for Children

Fabric scraps and a piece of felt for background make a creative game/ activity for children of any age. If the child wants to save the picture to frame, place a piece of iron-on adhesive under the selected fabric. Adults should do the ironing if the child is too young. Educators of young children suggest that a variety of textured fabric adds to the experience. Keep it simple or complex according to the age of the child (ages 2-102).



Judith's Magnolia Bud February 2001

The magnolia bud is made from two shades of pink, one pink for the bud and a second pink for the bud tip. The leaves are to be green. Please use an off white background.

The block is an unequal nine patch and is constructed as such. Templates are used for all the triangles. (Reverse template A for the AR pieces.) The rest of the block is template free. 1/4 inch seam allowances are included in the template and squares. The block should measure 8 1/2 inches.





Bud Tip $-1\frac{1}{2}$ - inch square

Leaves -1 each template A and AR

Background – 3 1½ - inch squares
3 2½ - inch squares
2 each template A and AR

Barbara Brackman in her "Encyclopedia of Pieced Quilt Patterns" attributes this block to the "Kansas City Star", 1932. She also shows a Nancy Cabot block of 1934 and 1936 called "Pink Magnolias" or "Magnolia Bud." Four buds are set together with their leaves touching and forming a four-pointed "star" shape in the center of the block.
