By supporting quilt related classes and workshops we ensure the art of quilting,



Jo Diggs Workshop "Appliqué Landscapes"

Friday, May 11, 2001

9 am. – 3:30 pm. Goleta Valley Community Center 5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta CA

Techniques for using layering to create illusions of space & distance, effects of color shifts, & simple perspective will be presented. Students will design their own landscapes from help given in class.

Supply list:

- Scissors sharp fabric, with pointed blades; long blades better than short.
- Needles slender for appliqué; size 10 or 11 sharps
- Thread to match your fabric; color match more important than fiber content.
- Pins straight; long & fine preferred
- Thimble
- Paper colored construction (or other paper) Minimum 3 colors, six sheets.
- Glue Stick

Optional:

- Marker –to draw shapes directly on fabric.
- Fabrics

Bring a wide range of **cotton** fabrics. Hand dyes, closely graded graduated colors work well. For example, light lavender to dark purple. Solids are visually quiet, prints are more active. Bring more small pieces than large ones. Fabrics with "glow" spots are often good. Teacher will have a small supply of pastel hand-dyed fabric pieces for sale at nominal cost.

Muslin: ½ yd for foundation for project, more if you plan to work large. In small projects, the sky fabric may be the foundation.

Jo Diggs Workshop Direct Designing-Freedom from Patterns"

Saturday, May 12, 2001

9 am. - 3:30 pm.

Goleta Valley Community Center, Room 6 5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta CA

Students will analyze images & practice dividing them into simple, basic shapes with free-hand cutting, no patterns needed. First subjects will be flowers & fish, with other subjects optional later. Focus will move to a richer, more varied & intricate images with exploration in fabric choices, multiple layering & repeating design elements. Hand stitching will be demonstrated, with optional work on machine.

Supply list:

- Scissors sharp fabric, with pointed blades; long blades better than short 3"
- Needles slender for appliqué, size 10 or 11 sharps
- Thread to match your fabric; color match more important than fiber content.
- Pins straight; long & fine preferred
- Thimble
- Paper colored construction (or other paper) Minimum 6 colors, six sheets.
- Glue Stick

Optional

- Sewing machine Handstitching is demonstrated by teacher, but you may bring your own machine if you usually assemble appliqué this way. Bring fusing material & thread. (Note: We have a smaller room & a minimum of outlets for use with machines.)
- Fabrics for completing floral & fish projects.

Cotton is best for handstitching, & does not need to be prewashed. Bring bright & fun, or quiet, sophisticated or a mix of both. Prints & solids, small stripes & plaids.

Bring lots of steps of graded colors, i.e., blues graded from light to dark. Hand dyes are useful.

If using knits, bring one-sided fusing material to stabilize.

Muslin – must have ½ yd or more to use as a foundation for your fabric projects.

Advanced Study

The focus will be on how to cut apart & restructure landscapes. Work will be in paper first. Any magazine photo, illustration, greeting card or other paper landscape will do. The teacher will provide a few free postcards per student. Teacher will also have available color reproductions of two of her own landscapes, image size approximately 12" x 18". Students may purchase & cut apart & reassemble as many sheets as they please. Cost will be nominal \$.50 @.

<u>Optional</u>: If students want to have fabric landscapes to cut apart & restructure they can prepare the landscapes prior to class. These can be made of WonderUnder applied fabric or actually stitched landscapes.

Must have:

Scissors – fabric & paper; long blades rather than short Glue stick
Foundations for gluing to, can be cardboard, poster paper, matt board or other 8 ½" x 11" or larger.
Paper Landscapes (see above.)

<u>Optional</u>:

Fabric
Sewing aids on supply list
Colored construction paper
Pencil for paper & fabric
Tracing paper
Ruler – rotary, gridded
Fabric glue, or tacking spray
Rotary cutter & matt, with fabric & paper blade



Library News

We have all used paper piecing since discovering how accurate it made our blocks look. And we are always searching for interesting block designs for this fast and easy technique. Well, here are 65 different designs grouped into geometrics, flowers, baskets, hearts, trees, and pictures. EASY MACHINE PAPER PIECING by Carol Doak has full size designs that can to

photocopied, 16 quilts in a colorful gallery made from these blocks, and pages of clear instructions and diagrams and tips: all the requirements for a perfect Guild library book! Now that's fine and easy because it's all straight seam piecing, but what about curves?

Jodie Davis has come up with PAPER-PIECIED CURVES. If

you stop to think about it, it's impossible to have flat paper-pieced curves. Sure enough, the eight quilts in this book demonstrate that after flipping the fabric over, you have excess fabric that must be pleated to meet the straight seam it encounters in the next block. Therefore, you have the added interest of an added dimension and a decidedly different effect. The projects illustrated range from easy to challenging.

In PATTERN PLAY Doreen Speckmann show you how you can design your own quilt and not be held hostage to templates from books or magazines or classes. Using graph paper, one idea leads to another and you soon have your own all-over design. You will most likely come up with block to block settings (no sashing) and your quilt will look most pleasingly complicated. After seven-eighths of the book is devoted to urging you to be creative and playful, Doreen includes a small

project section at the back and even templates in case you want to defy her and copy her designs. You will learn a lot and be entertained by her delightful self-deprecating and humorous chatting. WILLOWOOD by Jean Wells is the first book we have that is devoted to buttonhole stitch appliqué. Maybe the request for it was inspired by our recent block of the month flower that used the buttonhole stitch so effectively. Willowood has the

air of American folk art with flowers, houses, angels, animals all paired with traditional patchwork blocks and together form village, meadow, and forest scenes. Paperbacked adhesive is fused to the back of fabric and shapes are cut, then appliqued with embroidery thread or perle cotton. Jean recommends a plastic applique pressing sheet

made by Bear Thread Designs that is useful for ironing layered and arranged appliqués which can then be lifted off to be placed on background fabric. She gives useful tips on this simple method of creating a colorful quilt. There are also suggestions for a garden coat, a child's dress, purses, pillows and table runners. And then there is THE ULTIMATE SUNBONNET SUE PRIMER by Leisure Arts. Sixteen designs of Sue and a girl friend from an antique children's primer capture the charm of redwork first begun by Bertha Corbett Melcher at the turn of the twentieth century. Re-useable iron-on transfers are included and can be used on pillows, aprons, table runners, and dish towels. Quite a variety this month. Enjoy!

Southern California Quilt Run




The Southern

Yellow Charm Exchange to be held this Month

There will be a yellow charm square exchange at this month's guild meeting. The exchange will work the same way as the last exchange. The pieces are small but wasn't the quilt Desiree Cook showed at our February meeting wonderful! It was made from the fabrics she received in our last green exchange. To participate you need to:

- 1. Accurately cut 5-inch squares of five different yellow fabrics of good quality pre-washed and ironed cotton.
- 2. Tack five squares of five different fabrics together in one corner with your assigned number attached. (You were given your number when you signed up for the exchange).
- 3. When the signup closes, you will be phoned by those in charge to tell you how many packets you will need to prepare for all participants to receive one.

- 4. Bring your stacks of squares to the May meeting to be lined up with the stacks of the other participants. After distribution is complete you will go down the line of squares again and pick up one stack from each participant.
- **5.** Participants will be limited to no more than 40 members. (Last exchange 32 participated).
- 6. Note: The amount of fabric you will need will depend on the number of participants. You can get 12 five-inch squares from a fat quarter and if we have 40 participants you will need just over three fat quarters for each shade of yellow. You may "raid your stash" for fabrics? the packets do need to consist of the same five fabrics? they only need to be five different fabrics.

Challenge 2001

Chart a New Course Mariner's Compass

Give 'leeway' to your creative instincts, 'show your true colors' ...'hit the deck'....

The annual Guild Challenge is coming up in October.

The theme is nautical, featuring the fabulous pattern Mariner's Compass (you may make variations on it if you 'catch my drift'). Our guild library has several books with patterns as well as flip & sew techniques which makes the Compass possible for beginners and advanced alike. Barbara Barber's paper piecing workshop in April taught us the Compass pattern with flair!

Size: no greater than 144" circumference (or 36"x36" wall hanging).

Challenge: must include a Mariner's Compass of some type: pieced, appliquéd, printed, traditional, contemporary, fractured, etc.

'Get on board'... 'learn the ropes' for this beautiful pattern and enter the Guild Challenge this year. Presentation program October!

Mariner's Compass: A favorite of nineteenth-century quilt makers living on the Eastern Seaboard, this design is taken from the wind roses found on ship's compasses and sea charts. This Old English pattern can be traced back as far as the 1700's. Certainly a respected quilt block, with it's bold mixture of curves and narrow, radiating points and always in multiples of eight. Other names include Sunburst, Rising Sun and Chips & Whetstones. The compass is not only meant to point the way to our destination, but also to show us the way home.





Quilts and Medicine

As we make our quilts for Raggedy Anns and Andys to take to hospital patients we need to be mindful that we are also part of the cure for these folks. The quilts we make for them may make more of a difference than we can imagine. Our quilts let patients know that they are still part of the community, and that they are not alone in their fight to regain health. Our quilts are their connection to the world outside their hospital room—make them beautiful, make them often!

A Look Backward

American quilting changed when Marie Webster's designs were presented, in color, in the Ladies Home Journal in 1911. Marie had done handwork since childhood, but was a newcomer to appliqué quilts when she gained a national audience for her design work at age 52. Marie was influenced by the Arts and Crafts Movement and Lillian Wilson's 1908 advice to "go straight to nature" for design inspiration. This led Marie to design a series of flower quilts that were so popular, she was deluged with request for patterns. With the help of her son, Laurence, and his knowledge of blueprints, Marie began making blueprint patterns of her designs. In 1921, The Practical Patchwork Company was born. Marie and two close friends began to produce quilts, kits and patterns in an upstairs bedroom of Marie's house. The company prospered in this environment until World War II.

The Practical Patchwork Company motto was 'a joy forever', a line from a John Keats poem. That line has become the title of a fine book, bringing Marie Webster's work to modern quilters. Written by Rosalind Webster Perry, Marie's granddaughter, the book recounts Marie's life and influences as well as reviewing twelve of her beautiful flower quilt designs.

Newly drafted patterns, by our own Marty Frolli, insure that today's quilters will be able to stitch their own Marie Webster quilts with ease and confidence. Marty has redrafted Marie's designs for this book. You may recognize some of these patterns by other names, as rival quilt companies in the '20's and '30's freely stole Marie's designs and printed them with a new name as their own work.

Rosalind Perry and Marty Frolli are working on a second book titled. Marie Webster's Garden of Quilts, with fourteen more of her quilt designs. The book will be out soon, so watch for it. Marie Webster, herself, has written a well known book, Quilts, Their Story and How to Make Them. This book includes the history of quilts and techniques to make them, but no drafted patterns. Rosalind Perry has included an interesting biography of her grandmother in the latest edition of the book. Rosalind has been member of Coastal Quilter's Guild for many years and along with Marty Frolli, a local quilt teacher with extra ordinary skill, are keeping the Marie Webster patterns and history as vibrant today as were her flower quilts in the '20's and '30's.

Be sure to talk to Rosalind about her grandmother's quilts. While you are at it, ask about the Marie Webster House and the Quilter's Hall of Fame.

Lazy Daisy Oatmeal Cake

1 1/4 cup boiling water.....1 Cup uncooked oatmeal 1/2 cup butter

1 cup sugar

1 cup brown sugar

1 tsp. vanilla

2 whole eggs

1 1/2 cup flour

1 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

3/4 tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Pour boiling water over oatmeal.

Cover, let stand 20 minutes.

Cream together butter and sugars until fluffy.

Blend in vanilla and eggs, then add oats and mix well. Sift together flour, soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg.

Add to creamed mixture and mix well.

Pour batter into a well-greased and floured 9 inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 50-55 minutes.

Topping to broil on top of cake for 3-4 minutes.

1/4 cup butter

1/2 cup brown sugar

3 Tbs. cream

1/2 cup walnuts

3/4 cup flaked coconut

When cake is baked, cover with topping and place under the broiler until bubbly and slightly browned, but not burned. Topping needs to be watched closely while broiling.

Betty's Flower Basket

Background -white or off white

A-1 2 ½ inch square

B - 2 2 1/4 by 5 3/4 inch rectangles

C - 1 template C triangle

D - 6 triangles (see note below)

Basket – blue or green – use one or two fabrics

E - 8 triangles (see note below)

FB-1 triangle cut from template FB


Flowers - medium to large floral print

F - 1 triangle cut from template F

NOTE – For D and E triangles diagonally cut a 2 5/8 inch square in half.

To Construct block -


1. Join F and FB to make center




3. Sew one Basket D triangle to each of the B rectangles.

4. Sew units in 3 to block and add triangle C.
