Hi Quilters: It is hard to believe, but it is already time to start thinking about filling positions on next year's board even though it



TIPS: Make your challenge quilt Mariner's Compass block in a class or workshop. You will still be able to keep the rest of the quilt a

secret! Our guild library has several books with patterns as well as flip & sew techniques that make the Compass possible for beginners and advanced.

SIZE OF ENTRY QUILT: no greater than 144" circumference (or a 36"x36" wall hanging)

CHALLENGE: quilt must include a Mariner's Compass of some type: pieced, appliqued, printed, traditional, contemporary, fractured, etc.

# Library News

Sara Nephew is the queen of tumbling blocks and the 60 degree angle. She has manufactured a Super 60 Tool, essentially a triangular ruler, that combines all the measurements needed for 3 D designs. And that is what her new book, THE BIG BOOK OF BUILDING BLOCK QUILTS is all about. She describes 3D theory, shading, or value, that creates it, and cutting and piecing rules for that tumbling effect. Seventeen inspiring quilts in color that contain buildings or abstract designs as well as tumbling blocks. We have Harriet Berk to thank for requesting this title.

Two books by Ursula Reikes on baby quilts aren't enough for our library so we've added her new book EVEN MORE QUILTS FOR BABY with 20 new designs. The quilts are easy; the effectiveness comes from the fabric used. Did you see Oleta's hanging on the wall in Blue Island? Try using a Japanese print as she did.

Jean Ray Laury will be visiting us in the next year so we have purchased her latest book THE PHOTO TRANSFER HANDBOOK. Anything that can be copied or printed on a computer can be transferred to fabric so besides portraits think children's drawings, landscapes, images of art objects. She includes a full discussion of copyright laws. Half the book is devoted to the process of photo transfer using a color laser copier or a computer printer. Clear instructions with illustrations and problems of transfer are presented as well as appropriate fabric and quilting suggestions. The second half of the book contains a colored gallery of quilts providing new ideas for traditional patterns. A resource directory is in the back. Another lecturer we will have in 2002 is 4 Sharyn Craig. Her fresh-off-the-press

SETTING SOLUTIONS is so full of good ideas that you find yourself reading it from beginning to end. Rather than flipping through for design ideas, you get hooked on "watching" her solve problems that have been YOUR problems. You begin thinking of those blocks you set aside two years ago. She works with common problems like the wrong colors, varying sizes, orphans blocks. She makes you see the value of a design wall! There are 62 quilts that illustrate her ingenious solutions.

OK, so finally we have a cat book. THE CAT'S MEOW by Janet Kline should satisfy our cat lovers. Nothing more need be said except that this is cat nip even for quilters who are not.

To complete, hopefully, our growing redwork collections, we now have ALPHABET SUE by Betty Alderman. She has 24 nine inch blocks with Sue hanging around the letter in a darling manner. With red sashing and borders this is a crisp little quilt about 45" X 58". Good for a grand daughter-and for those blocks to take with you on trips.

A few non-book notes: several months ago someone picked up ART & INSPIRATION: RUTH McDOWELL without checking it out. We have been waiting for it's return. Please check at home to see if you have the library's copy. Thank you.

We have very few overdue books. Thanks for your diligence in returning them on time.

I will be moving out of the library chair next year. Be thinking about the fun of buying new books and helping the Guild by being the librarian. Two assistants to help during the meetings is ideal.

### A Look Backward

In 1933, mid-Depression days, the powers that be decided Chicago should host a grand World's Fair. They called it 'A Century of Progress.' The Sears Co. decided to sponsor a great 'Century of Progress Quilt Contest' which would promote both the World's Fair and the Sears Company. In today's dollars, the \$1,200 in prize money would equal about \$20,000--a fortune to the thousands of women who entered the contest, even in today's terms. Little did the Sears Co. estimate the delight and response of quilters, or the out pouring of quilts that would be submitted from around the country.

Sixty years later, in 1993, Meriday Waldvogel and Barbara Brackman published their book Patchwork Souvenirs of the 1933
World's Fair. They did not know when they began research on the contest, it's quilts, and the quilter makers, how difficult it would be to locate the 24,878 quilts that were entered at various levels of the contest. In fact, at the time of publication, they had located only 123 quilts.

These modern quilt historians also discovered a mystery and a fraud. The only trace of the Grand Prize winning quilt they could find was a Sears catalog page announcing the contest winners, and an partial line drawing of the quilt showing the pattern and the quilting motifs. A photo of the Grand Prize winner and its maker, Margaret Rogers Caden, graced the Sears catalog page. The text gushed that the quilt was now in the White House, a gift to Mrs. (Eleanor) Franklin D. Roosevelt. But the quilt was not in the White House collection when the authors tried to trace it. In fact, to date, the Grand Prize winning quilt cannot be located anywhere. How such a well publicized, prize

quilt could be lost is a mystery. Many replicas survive. Commercial quilt pattern makers sold patterns and kits to women who wanted to have their own version of the prize winner, but the original is no where to be found.

The quilt was 'Star of the Bluegrass pattern' with fern leaves in padded quilting. We know what the ferns looked like and what the quilt's colors looked like because Merikay and Barbara located the women who actually made the quilt and one of them still had her practice pieces.

Margaret Caden, official contest entrant, ran a needle work business with her sisters. Several Kentucky women remember working on the quilt. Mattie Black stuffed the ferns and sent the piece to Ida Rhorer to be pieced in the top. Ellen Mainous gave the star quilt top to Allie Price who added the cross-hatch quilting behind the stuffed work. Her mother and sisters helped her.

The finished quilt was sent to Margaret Caden, who signed the entry form which stated, "I certify that this quilt is entirely of my own making." Margaret Caden mailed "her" quilt to the Sears office in Chicago, rather than the closer regional office. Perhaps she wanted to avoid people who might understand that she "did not know which end of the needle to thread." When she won the Grand Prize, she did not share it with the women who had worked so skillfully on the quilt, even thought she was, by far, better off financially than any of them. Quite an ending to the biggest quilt contest ever held.

If you would like to read the stories of the other 123 quilt entries and their makers, seek out the Waldvogel and Brackman book. You may decide one of the other quilts should have been the big prize winner--I did. If you ever

run across an old quilt that was in the 1933 quilt contest, Merikay and Barbara would like to be contacted. They are still looking for 24,755 quilts.

---What questions are posed by this article? How far must contest rules be followed? If projects are group make, how should prize money be divided? What were the White House rules on gifts to a President/spouse in 1933? If the gift was personal, could

Eleanor Roosevelt have kept it or re-gift it to someone else?

How long should the maker continue to consider the gift her own? Is it possible, that the gift came back to Margaret Caden or to Sears Co. making it possible to regift it to another person or museum? -- This is a knotted trail and only some of the questions quilt historians might consider in solving a mystery.




### May Show & Tell





# **About Sewing Machines**

All sewing machines (not sergers), less than 40 years old may safely use the 130/705H needle system. Older machines may use a different needle system, check your instruction book or ask a dealer. The hook of the machine cannot pick up thread from the long, grooved side of the needle, replacing the needle correctly is critical. When threading the machine, RAISE the PRESSER FOOT. Use the same thread for the top of the machine as for the bobbin, unless you are doing a particular modern sewing project requiring specialized threads. Low priced needles and thread often have thick and thin areas, thus making it impossible to regulate thread tension.



a smile is an inexpensive way to improve your looks.



Instructions: This block looks best if done by Hand (needleturn) Appliqué. However, alternative methods are acceptable for the drawing. Start with stem, which is 1/2" x 7" finished. Use 1) your favorite method: make a tube, cut a strip of freezer paper or just cut a strip of fabric 1" x 8" to needleturn by 1/4 inch on both long sides. Place stem on diagonal center line of fabric, approximately 3/4" from "finished" corner of block. 2) Applique petal pieces in numbered order. Note that pieces 3 & 3R can be combined and cut as one piece. The same is true for 4 & 4R. 3) Add stem "bud" 4) Add leaves as shown in mini-diagram. Colors: Stem and pieces 1 and 6: Green Pieces 3, 3R and 5 - main flower color (think of irises) Pieces 2 & 2R - lighter shade of main color Pieces 4 & 4R - contrast color (i.e. yellow on purple flower) Background - White or white on white Note: You may wish to enlarge mini-version to size of finished block (12"). Unfortunately, this newsletter format doesn't allow a full size pattern.
