

> ëspecialty will be greatly appreciated), and bring one or two fat- quarters to be given to the new members as welcome gifts.



Library News

We have a special book this month given to us by the authors, Rosalind Webster Perry and Mary Frolli. Newly published, MARIE WEBSTERS GARDEN OF QUILTS tells

the story of Rosalind's grandmother, an Indiana quilter, who with the help of her son, built the first successful quilt business in the first decade of the Twentieth Century. Marie designed mostly floral appliqué patterns and kits that became the rage through their publication in The Ladies Home Journal. From

lovely pink roses on the cover of this book through colorful and attractive pages we follow Marie's lead from the traditional Nineteenth Century quilt designs to Art Nouveau and Arts and Crafts designs she introduced to quilts. She gained an international reputation, traveled widely through the world, and published the first book on quilts, QUILTS: THEIR STORY AND HOW TO MAKE THEM. This is the second book on Marie Webster, the first, also by Rosalind and Marty, is A JOY FOREVER. What a wonderful life she led. No wonder she was inducted into the Quilter's Hall of Fame in 1991.

To ease us down from the high of such a thrilling career, we have the two volumes of The Museum of the American Quilter's Society Permanent Collection in Paducah, Kentucky entitled simply QUILTS, Volumes 1 and 2. These are museum catalogs of quilts purchased and acquired during the years 1984 to 1994. Each quilt is illustrated on a full-page with a one-page statement by

the quilter. You will recognize many of these contemporary quilters working nearly 100 years after Marie Webster. Thank you, Carol Boyce for donating these to the library.

Because Mickey Lawler will be our featured speaker in September we have bought

MICKEY LAWLERÇ'S SKY DYES. Mickey is a nationally known fabric painter and quilter and her hand-painted fabrics are in demand. C&T Publishing encourages teachers to use this book as a text. If you are interested in hand-painted fabrics, this is for you. Reading the book with its many illustrated instructions is like

taking the workshop before September.

PICTORIAL QUILTS by Maggi McCormick Gordon is a large and well-arranged book on quilts depicting a preserved memory, a story, a location, a beloved animal, a portrait. After a brief history of pictorial quilts, comes the most valuable section of chapters on how to adapt the original source material, how to use perspective and compose your picture, and how colors, fabrics, and textures enhance the picture. Next follows a gallery of quilts showing land and sea, flowers and foliage, animals, figures and places.

Helping us shore up our grasp of Maggi's principles, along comes a donated book from Betty Kelley, THE LANDSCAPE QUILT by Sheryl Morrow Robinson. Norah McMeeking urges her students to search for this out-of-print book with its basic instructions for making beautiful landscape quilts and here it is in your Guild library!

More Library News

We could not let a month go by without adding a good old traditional quilt idea to all the new approaches we find today. PINEAPPLE QUILTS edited by Barbara Smith for AQS is not a stodgy old idea. But it is pure pineapple and that is traditional. This book presents the winner of the 1998 challenge in The Museum of the

American Quilt Society's annual international contest of 'New Quilts from Old Favorites'. The only design requirement for quilts in the contest was that they come from the Pineapple.

Like their other catalogs, this book contains a page devoted to the quilter as well as her quilt. There are full-size patterns and designs that

can be used to inspire or copy.

These are exciting Pineapples, no wonder the pattern has endured.

Pineapples are a good way to use those scraps, charms, and yards of material in your stash. Pineapple pieces are small but usually lots of material is eaten up.

October Guild Challenge Program is just 4 months away. It may seem there is plenty of time to make that great challenge quilt in your dreams.


CHALLENGE:

TIPS: Make your challenge quilt Mariner's Compass block in a class or workshop. You will still be able to keep the rest of the quilt a secret! Our guild library has several books with



Quilters Hall of Fame Announces Honoree for 2001

Kansas, with nearly 20 years devoted to

quilt research, has been selected as The

Barbara Brackman, from Lawrence,

Quilters Hall of Fame inductee for 2001. Brackman has played a remarkable number of roles within the quilting community: author, lecturer, teacher, curator, researcher, pattern collector, and quiltmaker. Her expertise in pattern and fabric identification, as well her insights and overview of quilt history, have had a profound impact nationally and internationally. Brackman wrote The Encyclopedia of Pieced Patterns, Encyclopedia of Appliqué, and Clues in Calico [A Guide to Identifying and Dating Antique Quilts], the latter probably the most referenced book in quilting history. Brackman has curated exhibits for the Knoxville Museum of Art. Kansas Museum of History, Wichita Art Museum, and Spencer Museum of Art at the University of Kansas, to name a few, and has trained participants in quilt documentation projects, among them Iowa Quilt Research Project, Georgia Quilt Project and the North Carolina Quilt Project. Brackman is highly sought after for lectures and fabric dating seminars. "Being inducted into The Quilters Hall of Fame is an appropriate way to say thanks and to recognize Barbara Brackman's many accomplishments in researching and preserving our quilt heritage," stated Hazel Carter, President of The Quilters Hall of Fame, upon announcing the selection. The induction will take place on July 21. 2001, during The Quilters Hall of Fame Celebration in Marion, Indiana. Workshops:

September 13 & 14 (Thurs. & Fri.) Mickey Lawler Paints on Fabric!

An introduction for the non-painter to the use of non-toxic paints on cotton fabric. The student will become familiar with various effects of watercolor paints applied with brushes, sponges and bottles. Experimental techniques & manipulation of fabric will also be covered. In a 1-day workshop the student is expected to have 3–5 yards of fabric & in the 2-day workshop, 6–10 yds. Her website is http://www.skydyes.com.

Because of the anticipated popularity, we have asked Mickey Lawler to add an extra day to the workshop schedule. She will be

here for a **total of 3 days**, Thurs., Fri., Sat, Sept. 13, 14 & 15, for a combination of 1 or 2 day workshops covering her methods of painting on fabrics.

Norah McMeeking will register the Mickey Lawler workshop in July. If, on the night of that meeting, we are oversubscribed for a workshop, we will have a lottery. We will hold the lottery as soon as possible to let applicants know their status. If we hold a lottery, the other names will be placed on a waiting list for space available. Remember, a check or cash for the amount of the workshop is needed to hold your space.





International Quilt Study Center

The University of
Nebraska in Lincoln is home to both
the International Quilt Study Cent and the
State Museum with its Hall of Mammoths.
(Not to be mistaken for mama- moths).

In March, 2001, an exhibition titled, "Fanciful Flowers, Botany and the American Quilt", was displayed in the Cooper Gallery. Curated by Carolyn Ducy of the Quilt Study Center, a dozen full-size quilts featuring flowers in various styles and forms were featured. The quilts were drawn from the Ardis and Robert James Collection located at IQSC.

Quilts from the 1800's included a blazing star with a leave border, followed by another border row of LeMoyne stars and finally, a border row of chintz cut-out flowers. It was marked as being from New England, circa 1850. One album quilt from Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, was three dimensional, the result of using a vo-vo technique for the flowers and berries that were first stuffed and then stitched to the quilt top. Sample blocks accompanied many of the quilts, illustrating the techniques used. These blocks were available for close examination or touching. One of the outstanding features of this exhibit was technical notes and historical comments on placards for each quilt. For each quilt, tidbits like the average number of stitches per inch (ranging from six to eleven for the hand-quilted works. One machine quilted piece was featured--not unusual for this period, as sewing machines, although numerous in the

1800's, were not resident in every household. Hand quilting was preferred and traditionally thought to be 'the only way' to make a quilt. However, those older, straight stitch, sewing machines can produce beautiful straight stitches. (Aren't we happy that has changed for many of us, allowing us to experiment and duplicate old techniques with new techniques?)

To keep the kids (or yourself) happy during the event, there was a hands-on Quilt Design Table, with a tray and brightly colored plastic shapes: triangles, squares and parallelograms.


