



Supply list

- Sewing machine (in good working order with spare needles)
- Sewing Kit pins, thread, needles, scissors; anything a good quilter would need to sew with.
- Rotary Cutting Supplies ruler, cutter & mat
- Freezer paper
- Pencil, paper, large eraser
- Gather some pictures of things you love, kids book illustrations are good, greeting cards, magazine photos, newpaper ads, a letter from a friend, a pin, a photo images that will help you jump off with your "pride & joy" quilt.

<u>Fabric</u>

Background: $1 - 1 \frac{1}{2}$ yds. of light, light or dark, dark, no mediums. Preference is tone on tone, no solids; light sky blue, soft butter or any gold, soft clear green, clear color of any light shade (no grayed lavenders or grayed greens) or darks in solid black, tone on tone black, navy blue, burgandy, forest green, purple, teal, or anything dark. Note: you may have more than one color background but the rule is don't change value – for example, you could have all soft golds, honey colors & butter yellows & they would blend into the wallhanging well.

Others: Lots of variety of fabrics with colors you wish to work with. You will be doing piecing of the rows of backgrounds & will need 1/3 yd. cuts of a good variety of fabrics — your leftovers will be your story pieces. Bring at least 6 of these or 9 for variety & fun. Bring smaller pieces for the "things" in your piece, people, animals — think of hair (stripes), buildings (wood, textures), birds (feathers), bikini's (polka dots), flowers (fun bright fabrics & green for leaves). Look at the book Whimsies & Whynots for more ideas. Later you can add embellishments, but you can bring some buttons, lace, old jewelry or handkerchiefs for discussion.

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break. Questions? Call Kristin Otte, 683-4390.

Library News

Are you looking for new Christmas gift inspiration AT THAT PATCHWORK PLACE has new work by some favorite authors like Roxanne Carter, Mimi Dietrich and Vicki Garnas. There are more than a dozen projects including wall hangings, large lap quilts and bed quilts using paper piecing and appliqué, and as they say, a Christmas quilt has a way of magically filing a room with all the warmth and comfort the holidays have to offer.

That Patchwork Place also sent us their annual two-book donation for our library: QUILTS FOR BOYS AND GIRLS by Barbara Roberts has ten projects using hand, freezer paper, and fusible appliqué. There are boys and girls playing soccer, on skateboards, using in-line and ice skates, in a space ship and on bicycles. Lots of technique tips you may not have thought of are included. Designs are simple enough to offer an easy way to introduce kids to quiltmaking, themselves.

SCRAPPY DUOS:COLOR RECIPES
FOR QUILT BLOCKS by Donna Thomas
presents twenty versatile block patterns that
are cut in pairs since half-square triangles
are used predominately and two blocks are
cut from one set of prints. Donna wanted to
avoid the muddy brown tone scrap quilts
often get when all the prints are mixed
together indiscriminately. Her plan is to
showcase each print in the quilt by cutting
all the pieces for one block from just one
dark or medium print and one background
print. Then, using a different light or dark
print for subsequent blocks, each block still



shines in it own colors without becoming a brown mush. She says you can do a pair of blocks at a time until you have enough for a quilt and you don't have to collect all your scrap fabrics at once- a good method for busy people. Take a look at her sparkling examples.


Eleanor Burns follows the same idea in her new book on BIRDS IN THE AIR: one dark print and one lighter print for background. This book about one quilt design has a wonderful method to avoid the stretch that comes from bias making piecing perfect blocks difficult. Careful step-by-step photographs get you to that perfect block every time. Yardage requirements are given for birds and nests for quilts from wall hangings to king size quilts. But it is the piecing instruction that makes this book worth its weight in gold.

THREADPLAY with Libby Lehman on mastering machine embroidery techniques is in the library at the request of a member, but I can't remember whose request. Was it yours? THREADPLAY has everything from elaborate thread-embellished quilts with couching and ribbon illusions to basic machine quilting. Libby doesn't follow all the rules but she says she hasn't been caught by the quilt police yet for crossing over a line when she stipples, for instance. Non-traditional fabrics and threads are featured as well as her non-traditional methods.


THANK YOU FOR TAKING THE OPPORTUNITY!

A Pressing Tip:

Here's a cool way to take some heat off ironing time: Wash large pieces, 8 to 10 yards of fabric and dry it in the dryer until almost dry. Then fold the fabric and bag it in plastic. Place in the freezer. Press when convenient.

to donate to a local organization. Guild members are making blocks for this quilt using the October Block-of-the-Month pattern found in the September newsletter and on the Guilds web page. If you download the pattern from the web page, you may need to resize it in a drawing program or on a copy machine to make sure that the block measures 6 1/2 inches including seam allowances or 6 inches finished. The deadline for receipt of the blocks is November 15th so that the quilt can be finished in a timely manner. Do old quilts talk to you? Do you want to know more about quilt history? Then read this!


This site tells you everything you need to know about the American Quilt Study Group, an organization that will help you learn about old quilts and their stories. The American Quilt Study Group encourages, presents, and preserves research on quiltmakers, quilts and quiltmaking.

The word "group" is misleading if it makes you think small because we are a BIG group! Founded in 1980, we have over 1000 members from the United States and seventeen other countries. Membership is comprised of traditional and contemporary quilt artists, quilt lovers, historians, researchers, collectors, dealers, folklorists, authors, museum curators, quilt appraisers, and students of women's studies.

Sally Garoutte, founder of the organization, lived in Mill Valley, California. The organization began as a small gathering of quilt historians seated at Sally's kitchen table and has grown into a unique and highly respected international organization.

New Directions has asked that the stockings be fairly uniform in size and that the stocking be personalized with the name of a recipient. There will be a list of names at the October meeting, and the name can be applied with embroidery, permanent marker, or any other method you choose. Drawn on this page is a pattern for a stocking, but you may use your own pattern of approximately the same size. Decorate and embellish with Christmas designs as you desire. Materials are your choice.

THOM E-E 4+ ENDY EXTEND LOY 77

-- Put the outside stocking with its right side out inside the -- Adjust the lining inside and top stitch around the top to lining with its right side in (the two right sides will be --With right sides together, sew all around except at the -With right sides together sew around leaving a 4 inch opening in the foot; do not sew the top; clip curves -- Turn the stocking through the opening in the lining Fabric: 1/3 yd. for outside; 1/3 yd for lining -- Push the lining inside the stocking --Whip-stitch the opening closed -- Turn right side out; press --Sew all around the top keep the lining inside Seam Allowance: 1/4 inch facing each other) top; clip curves Opening -- Do not turn Finishing.

Nominations 2002

Hello Quilters.

Nominations this year has been a curious process. People seem willing to do the jobs associated with administering the guild but are reluctant to commit to those jobs dealing with the very core of our collective existence, quilting. Namely, no one has volunteered to do opportunity quilts. As a solution to this dilemma, and as a way to involve the entire membership in the opportunity quilt, the board has proposed A CONTEST.

Here is how it goes.

Anyone in the guild is eligible to submit a quilt design. The design should include a drawing of the entire quilt, and a drawing of the block. It can be scrappy or of a planned color scheme. It can be appliqued, pieced, or a combination of techniques. The finished designs will be displayed at a guild meeting, and the membership will vote on their favorite by committing to make a block, or to work on the assembly or quilting.

Get your pencils sharpened or your computer programs booted up. Try combining traditional blocks in a non traditional way. Design a simple quilts in unusual colors. Let your creativity reign.

Designs may be turned in at the guild meetings in November and December, or mailed(regular or e-) to Ranell by December 31. We will have the entries at the January meeting for everyone to see.

Meeting Heighlights

January Program

Reynola Pakusich from Bellingham WA will speak on "Color Challenges." Reynola, who comes from a long line of quilters, bases her work on traditional forms and techniques, uses contemporary fabrics from her ethnic and hand-dyed collection. Her talk discusses "color challenges", offering solutions and examples with many quilts.

January Workshops

Reynola believes that "your fabrics have a world of information to communicate to you." In her workshops she helps the student develop her listening skills in the subtle world of fabric interplay. In her workshops she gives you the opportunity to practice fabric communication skills that help you see the interplay and excitement that fabric colors, textures and values generate, as well as learn to listen, manage and develop that subtle interplay for your own quilts.

Fri., Jan. 11 "Fabric Play"

This one-day class demonstrates the process from that selected wonderful "theme" fabric, analyzing the support fabrics that make it work, suggesting types of blocks or quilt designs for the fabric run; and finally the value strategies of arranging into the quilt top. The participants will go through this same process with guidance of the teacher and interaction between quilters.

Sat., Jan. 12 "Serpentine Quilt"

This workshop is planned to help the quilter learn to machine piece two sizes of curves using a versatile block to form diagonal line or meandering paths. The class devotes much time to analyzing fabric choices, design composition and values.

2 TSP CINNAMON

We've set a project deadline of March 31, 2002.





Anne's Christmas Cactus

Anne adapted a traditional pattern, Rosebud, to suggest the essence of a favorite local succulent that blooms at Christmas time.

Make 4 units using the large diagram. For color, choose an off white background, green, with a touch of yellow for the leaves and red for the flowers. Use scant ¼ inch seams throughout and construct the half-square triangles by your favorite method or ask an experience quilter for guidance if you need help. Rotate the units at the center and assemble the finished block. Block size is 9 ½ inches unfinished.
