

# Library News

A truly exciting book is QUILT **NATIONAL 2001 THE BEST CONTEMPORARY QUILTS** published by Lark Books and the Dairy Barn Cultural Center of Ohio. It shows the direction quilt art is taking today. For 22 years Quilt National exhibits have been showcasing quilt artists of the day. This year's exhibit began in Athens, Ohio and will travel to museums around the country into 2003. The closest it will come to us is the Crocker Museum of Art in Sacramento, December 4, 2001 to February 17, 2002. If you can't make it up there, this exhibition catalog will take you out on the edge, if not to Sacramento. These are the most innovative, outstanding quilts being made today.

QUILTING WITH CAROL
ARMSTRONG is more about quilting designs with the needle than patchwork or appliqué. Her quilts are basically white with appliqué, silk ribbon embroidery, redwork, paint and other embellishments enhancing the quilting designs, resulting in a clean, fresh look. "If you love quilting more than any other aspect of our art, this book is a must," says Alex Anderson.


For wearable art enthusiasts, ART TO WEAR WITH ASIAN FLAIR by Stephanie Masae Kimura uses Japanese fabrics appliquéd in projects from purses to vests to kimonos. Elaborate beading is used on many of the

garments making them fit for royalty! Instructions in the use of inks, dyes, fabric pens, brushes, stencils, tassels, beads are given. One chapter is devoted to Asian motif templates that you can use in your own way.

Intended as a practical guide rather than a scholarly treatise, DATING FABRICS: A COLOR GUIDE 1800-1960 by Eileen Jahnke Trestain is spiral bound and a delight to use. It is full of thousands of swatches, a description of the period they represent, its colors, and print styles. Resources and a glossary are I included. Perusing this book may be the first time your interest is piqued by antique quilts and/or reproduction fabrics

Now for four patchwork books:
101 NINE PATCH QUILTS by
Marti Michell is perfect for beginners because of the squares and
straight line sewing. An excellent
section on diagonal setting of blocks
and the secret of setting triangles so
the disastrous stretch of bias doesn't
ruin good work is included. Once
you get that down, you can't go
wrong with this backbone of
American quilting.

THE ULTIMATE HALF LOG CABIN BOOK by Sharyn Craig uses three patterns; namely, half of a log cabin, half of a log cabin with a triangle stuck in, and chevrons made by color bands in the half log cabin. The resulting quilts are the kind that

stand out from a distance because of their startling color placements.

THE CREATIVE PATTERN BOOK by Judy Martin was a request by Carol Boyce. Thanks, Carol. Most people know Judy Martin is a major quilt designer using traditional blocks in new ways. Judy's purpose is to inspire you to try to create your own design. Each section for the 12 patterns presented begins with a "What was I thinking?" paragraph. It's another personal "talking to you" book that makes reading it fun. And if you aren't brave enough to design your own quilt, you can still copy Judy's clever designs. Look at her Byzantine Flower Garden quilt.

SCRAP FRENZY by Sally Schneider does what you want it to: use those scraps! What makes it different is interesting quilting in the non-colored areas, a combination of large and small scraps, a good pieced chicken pattern, and the use of plaids in one star pattern.


The library will be turned over to Joe and Peggy Beavers and their daughter Laura Lynn in the coming year. How good to have a family-run committee!

She has been in two of Joan's books and also those of Marsha McClosky. When an author is planning a book Reynola will get a call. They discuss what the theme of the book will be and meet to review her recent work or plan something new to be included. She is looking forward to coming to Santa Barbara and hopes the weather will cooperate as she would love to spend some time on the beach.



# Reynola Pakusich Workshop "Fabric Play"

Reynola believes that "your fabrics have a world of information to communicate to you." In her workshops she helps the student develop her listening skills in the subtle world of fabric interplay. She gives you the opportunity to practice fabric communication skills that help you see the interplay & excitement that fabric colors, textures & values generate, as well as learn to listen, manage & develop that subtle interplay for your own quilts.

This one-day class demonstrates the process from that selected wonderful "theme" fabric, analyzing the support fabrics that make it work, suggesting types of blocks or quilt designs for the fabric run; & finally the value strategies of arranging into the quilt top. The participants will go through this same process with guidance of the teacher & interaction between quilters.

#### **Supply list:**

- Sewing machine (in good working order with spare needles)
- Rotary Cutting Supplies ruler, cutter & mat
- Sewing Kit Pins, Thread, Needles
- Fabric & Paper Scissors
- Design Wall/Fleece to design on
- Masking Tape
- Pins
- Template Material
- Note taking supplies

#### Fabric run to analyze:

- 16+ fabrics with variety of values (light, medium & dark), texture, size of motifs, density, movement (stripes, plaids & florals, & character to support your chosen theme or idea fabric. More variety is better than less, in fat quarter to ½ yard amounts.
- Optional pictures, books or magazines of block or quilt ideas.

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break. Questions? Call Kristin Otte, 683-4390.

# "Serpentine Workshop"

Reynola believes that "your fabrics have a world of information to communicate to you." In her workshops she helps the student develop her listening skills in the subtle world of fabric interplay. She gives you the opportunity to practice fabric communication skills that help you see the interplay & excitement that fabric colors, textures & values generate, as well as learn to listen, manage & develop that subtle interplay for your own quilts.

This workshop is planned to help the quilter learn to machine piece two sizes of curves using a versatile block to form diagonal line or meandering paths. The class devotes much time to analyzing fabric choices, design composition & values.

#### **Supply list:**

- Sewing machine (in good working order with spare needles)
- Rotary Cutting Supplies ruler, cutter & mat
- Sewing Kit Pins, Thread, Needles
- Fabric & Paper Scissors
- Design Wall/Fleece to design on
- Masking Tape
- Pins
- Freezer Paper for making templates
- Note taking supplies

#### Fabric run:

- Might be an expanded color run (for example: blue (light, medium & dark, including blue-green & blue-violets).
- Perhaps a collection of "special fabrics" or fabrics you want to "show off" in a quilt. Be sure to bring some "support" fabrics for them (color related, but lower design contrast such as tone-on-tone.
- Design collection (for example: a wide variety of circles or dots or a plaid collection.)

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break.

Boost of Vitamin C

1 small pkg. raspberry
Jell-O, dissolved in 1 cup

#### Test Your Quilt Knowledge

- 1. What is the purpose of a quilt label?
- 2. What is the minimum information that should go on a label?
- 3. How can you keep the label from being detached from your quilt?

#### Answers to

#### Test your Quilt Knowledge:

- 1. A quilt label preserves the identity of the maker/quilter and is vital for dating a quilt. A label can be a functional and decorative part of the quilt. A label can become an interesting challenge in itself!
- 2. Be sure to include the maker's name, the date and location where the quilt was made. It's on the label that the maker can include the names of other piecers, appliquérs, or quilters who took part in the making of the quilt. If the quilt is in honor of an occasion, a gift, memory quilt or story quilt, the label is the place to record that information for posterity.

Try making a label appropriate to the design on the top or back of the quilt. It can be a piece of art in itself, i.e., an appliqué quilt with appliqué-style label. Why not piece your label into the front of the quilt as part of the design! It will be fun to search for the puzzle piece.

3. Embroidery on the label is elegant and most sewers know the stem stitch. Or you can use fine pointed permanent ink pens -- directly on the label fabric. Test wash a trial label. If it the ink bleeds or washes out, then so will the label. To write with permanent pens, place fabric on top of sandpaper or stabilizer on freezer paper before writing (remove paper backing). Label can be attached to the quilt before or after final quilting, but make sure the label is securely attached in the binding or quilting so that it does not rip off. In addition to sewing it into a seam, a label can be decoratively overstitched by machine.


Iron-on labels always need to be sewn on to the quilt for security.


A second label location, within the top or back design or under the binding, will assure credit is given to the maker in case the larger label is removed.

A label can be anywhere on the quilt front or back. However, most contests require it on the lower right or left hand corner of the back, check contest rules.



# Little Flag Project Update


To date the LFQP has made 342 Little Flag Quilts. I'd like the overall goal of the project to be 1000 quilts!

The majority of these quilts have been sent to Cass Cooney in D.C. for distribution. This week a large presentation will be made to the men and women at Virginia Medical Center in Arlington. This hospital is the closest to the Pentagon and the hospital most involved in the incident. In addition to nurses, doctors, and paramedics, other employees pitched in to help. The "suits" left their offices and were directing traffic and cafeteria workers rushed to the emergency to hand out water. We want to give these people a very big thank you and so 151 Little Flags will be presented to them. In addition to Virginia Medical Center, the Washington Hospital Center's Burn Unit handled a large number of patients on 9/11. 65 quilts will be presented to them.

Other quilts have been presented to firemen at the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department, the Kentland Volunteer Fire Department, the Morningside Fire Department, the Cottage City Fire Department and the Branchville Fire Department.

And other quilts have been presented to members of the Coast Guard, military personnel who aided in the rescue efforts at the Pentagon, and even a chiropractor who gave the firemen back massages and adjustments.

In addition to sending our sincere gratitude to those involved in rescue and recovery



efforts at the Pentagon, quilts have been sent to a number of families who lost a family member at the Pentagon crash and two families who lost a love one to Anthrax

From Santa Barbara we've sent a number of quilts to individuals. Information on these individuals came from our guild members and in response to our media coverage. Families who received these quilts were located in California, Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas, Illinois, New Jersey, Virginia and Maryland.

We have a number of contacts in New York - in Brooklyn and Manhattan. We are currently working to collect names and addresses of firemen who lost their lives on 9/ll. We'll begin sending quilts to families of men from two firehouses, one in each Borough and we'll continue sending quilts to other firehouses as our supply allows. We are also trying to obtain information on men and women from the Port Authority.

Also, we are currently collecting information on individuals who died in the Pennsylvania crash. So where are the quilts coming from so far? We have had 22 of the 50 states respond positively to our letters, emails and message boards. Local quilters have made the majority of the quilts, but we have received 14 quilts

from other California quilters in Arroyo Grande, Cambria, Costa Mesa, Oakdale, Port Hueneme, Santa Maria, Simi Valley and Lompoc. We've received 14 quilts from quilters in Louisiana, Maryland, Washington, Missouri, Arizona, and New York. Its been fun to see the different fabrics used! Although, the number coming from outside the guild has been low so far, I'm expecting much more. I've received a number of emails and phone calls from quilters who are working on their flags. Some guilds have set a deadline within their guild and will send a box of quilts after their deadline.

We are beginning to receive thank you notes, some are very touching and just break your heart! Here are some excerpts: "We are touched by your generosity and sympathy and will cherish our flag." "Our family will truly treasure your kind gift for a long time." "I made a corner with all the memories from my husband and put the flag with it." "Thank you very much for making us such a lovely gift! It will be a nice way to remember all the love, caring and support the American people have bestowed upon me and my two daughters during this sad and difficult time." "The September 11th tragedy has effected everyone and my family, who lost someone very close, understands how important it is to connect with others to share our loss. Again thank you all for the flag, hanging proudly in my dining room."

#### SO WHAT CAN YOU DO?

- 2. Make a quilt top or any part of the quilt.
- 3. Donate fabric for the kits.
- 4. Donate the cost of a kit: \$25.00.
- 5. Make a contribution to the project (covers packaging and postage). Make checks to: Coastal Quilters Guild, Memo: Little Flag Quilt Project.



#### January 2002 Block of the Month

#### fun with half-square triangles

I hope you haven't used up all of your blue and there are several methods for making half-square triangles. Find one you like.

Start by cutting squares that are 2 7/8 inches on each side. You'll need 8 blue (any shade) and 8 white (or white-on-white, off white.)

Whether you cut them on the diagonal and sew them back together or use another method, the unfinished 2-color square (figure A) should be 2 ½ inches on each side. You should have 16 of them. The finished size (when sewn into the final block) will be 2 inches.

Assemble the squares as shown in figure B.

The block will be 8 1/2 inches unfinished, or 8 inches finished.




