
December Meeting

Triangle trading will start the workshop - a great way to get a variety of fabrics for a new scrap quilt. Once you have your assortment of light and dark triangles, we will work with a quick method for piecing the Northwind block. You will be encouraged to play with the block through coloration and pattern so each quilt will be unique.

Supply List

- Sewing Machine and Basic Sewing Supplies
- Rotary Cutter, Mat, Strip Cutting Ruler (6 X 12 is my favorite)
- Flannel, white or off white ... approx 1 yd. for a design wall
- **FABRIC:** For the trade you need to bring:
 - Twelve 9" squares of a light value print
 - Twelve 9" squares of a dark value print


Please make sure the fabric is 100% cotton, washed and ironed

*Bring additional squares for your own use in the workshop, either to supplement what you get in the trade, or to use independently. Trading is NOT an option, it is a requirement; however, you may elect to work in different fabric than you receive in the trade. You can't have too much fabric so don't be conservative.

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break. Questions? Call Kristin Otte 683-4390.

Friday, January 10, 2003 Sharyn Craig Workshop – Northwind

The Northwind block is a traditional one that lends itself to scrap fabric. Students will trade fabric in this workshop to gain a variety of fabric and values to choose from. Sharyn will show us her slick, efficient, organized method of cutting and piecing triangles to create a variety of different blocks. She's come up with eight different blocks to select from, or you can design your own. Even quilters who have been previously intimidated by triangles find this workshop fun and freeing.





Needle Type	Purpose/Usage	
Universal	These all-purpose needles are for general sewing on both knit and woven fabrics. They are available in both American and European sizing. The larger the size number, the larger the needle diameter.	
Ballpoint, Stretch, and Yel- low Band	These are used for tightly constructed knits, such as nylon/Lycra swimwear and cotton/Lycra blends. The points on these needles are rounded, allowing the point to slide between the knit stitches. Normally blue or yellow shanked, they are available in size 75 (11) and 90 (14). These needles help prevent skipped stitches in these knit fabrics.	
Denim	Ruggedly engineered to pierce dense fabrics such as	
Leather	These needles are designed to be used with leather, not on any fabric or synthetic suedes. The cutting point is a knife-edge. Typically a size 90 (14) is used.	
Topstitching	These size 90 (14) needles have an extra-large eye to	
Double or Twin	The most popular specialty needles, these give per-	
Metafil Embroidery	These needles are specially designed to be used with your metallic embroidery threads. The two brands that I am aware of are Madeira and Sullivans. They are available as single and twin needles. Sizes are typically 80 (12)/4.0 mm for twin and Metallic 40, 15, and 12. The eye of the needle is finished with a Teflon coating which helps the metallic threads to slip easily through and be less likely to fray.	
Microtex Sharp Needle	These needles are specially designed to be used with the new micro fiber fabrics. With an extremely fine, sharp point, these needles penetrate the fiber much more cleanly than a Universal Sharp. They range in size from a 60 (8) to an 80 (12).

CREATIVE STITCHERY Part 2

can offer no rules on how to work. You see things differently from the way I do. We react differently and express ourselves differently. It is these differences at the heart of our work that make it personal and expressive. If you bring deep feelings, a sense of values, and craftsmanship into your work, you cannot help but be original. It is the inevitable by-product of these things.

There is a frantic attempt by many people to be "original" at all costs. So much emphasis is given to originality that the creative becomes confused with the novel. And that thing that was novel soon becomes a cliché. The most common materials can become works of art if the ideas and the execution are expressed creatively.

Good craftsmanship is an essential on my list. A hastily done piece will always look like a hastily done piece. Sloppiness and novel effects are not virtues, even if they pass at first for "original." If you enjoy the materials you work with, and you value your time and your idea, the craftsmanship will grow out of this.

I work within the limitations of certain materials, preferring to appliqué with cottons, using either cottons or woolens for the backing panels. I like the clear fresh brightness of cottons, and the crisp edges resulting when they are worked. I do not like to work with a non-woven fabric such as felt or pellon, though you may find that you prefer them in your own work.

I feel the need of consistency; it is part of the order I wish to achieve. Perhaps for you this would be restrictive. I am not suggesting that your limitations be like mine. Your own will grow out of your work. Whatever materials you choose to use, there must be sound craftsmanship and honest artistic expression.

I begin work from imagination—not from drawings or plans, nor from nature. If I am doing a tree, I cannot look at a tree and begin. There is too much to see and it is overwhelming. Sometimes I can shut my eyes and visualize just the essentials that I wish to use. Then I cut the fabrics. Color, form, and idea merge as one.


Sometimes I cut pods in half, or I slice through a Brussels sprout or a berry and the cross-sections are beautiful. Occasionally these will prompt sketches to help me remember. My sketch is not copied from the seed that inspired it, nor do I ever try to copy the sketch in an appliqué.








Based on her 1995 book, "A Celtic Garden," this workshop covers basic Celtic Bias









Any Blues and whites. Piece 2 1/2" strips. Cut into triangles from template. Trim block to 12" x 12"


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
