




# NEW President's Message:

# **Sharyn Craig Workshop**

"Northwind"

### Friday, January 10, 2003

9 am. - 3:30 pm.

Goleta Valley Community Center 5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta CA

Triangle trading will start the workshop - a great way to get a variety of fabrics for a new scrap quilt. Once you have your assortment of light and dark triangles, we will work with a quick method for piecing the Northwind block. You will be encouraged to play with the block through coloration and pattern so each quilt will be unique.

#### **Supply List**

- Sewing Machine and Basic Sewing Supplies
- Rotary Cutter, Mat, Strip Cutting Ruler (6 X 12 is my favorite)
- Flannel, white or off white ... approx 1 yd. for a design wall
- FABRIC: For the trade you need to bring:

Twelve 9" squares of a light value print

Twelve 9" squares of a dark value print


Please make sure the fabric is 100% cotton, washed and ironed

\*Bring additional squares for your own use in the workshop, either to supplement what you get in the trade, or to use independently. Trading is NOT an option, it is a requirement; however, you may elect to work in different fabric than you receive in the trade. You can't have too much fabric so don't be conservative.

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break. Questions? Call Kristin Otte 683-4390.

Friday, January 10, 2003 Sharyn Craig Workshop – Northwind

The Northwind block is a traditional one that lends itself to scrap fabric. Students will trade fabric in this workshop to gain a variety of fabric and values to choose from. Sharyn will show us her slick, efficient, organized method of cutting and piecing triangles to create a variety of different blocks. She's come up with eight different blocks to select from, or you can design your own. Even quilters who have been previously intimidated by triangles find this workshop fun and freeing.

### CREATIVE STITCHERY

Part 3

By Jean Ray Laury

(First printed in House Beautiful, January 1960, and reprinted here with the permission of the author, this is the very first article that she wrote—and it has now been followed by 25 books and countless more articles. Part one was in the November newsletter and Part two was in the December newsletter. The last part will appear in the February newsletter. Jean Ray Laury is the speaker for our March meeting, and she will be giving two workshops.)

t is important to be thoroughly familiar with the materials you are using. Technical training is of little help here, as this understanding cannot be absorbed except through handling and working with the fabrics and threads. You can study diagrams and read directions on how to appliqué a corner, but it means little until you have done it. The way to learn to appliqué is to appliqué.

In my work I am concerned with simple everyday objects—daisies, birds, apples. The things I have to say are not profound. I am delighted and amused by much of what I see in growing things (plants and children) and I think my enjoyment of these is obvious in my work. It is important to design for yourself, not for display or for the color schemes or a room or for pretension. Sentimental, cute things degrade this art.

Begin with something you love, something you're familiar with—a lemon tree, a marigold, a color, a plum. And trust your own ideas. For me, subject matter is important. I must work with something I have a feeling for. Sometimes I work with just form and color, and the subject is replaced by a mood

or a feeling, but I always return to subject matter.

Now let's assume that you are ready to begin work in appliqué. Using your scissors for your pencil, start cutting. Avoid trying to copy a pencil sketch. Since the transfer of a line drawing to colored shapes will alter the original anyway, start directly with the fabric. Use large simple shapes to begin with snipping and cutting until you have the desired form. Allow enough extra to turn under the fabric edges.

I find that it works best to cut a few pieces, pin, and begin sewing. Once these first ones are appliqued, more can be cut and added. Since the shapes change as you sew, the new ones will need to be cut and to change with it.

If you feel uncertain or hesitant about beginning, think in terms of something you may use: a crib quilt or a pillow cover. A pattern, to be repeated, is a good way to start. Use a simple geometric shape—a square, a circle, or a rectangle. Cut a number of these in various colors, and then start arranging and rearranging them. Just rectangles of several sizes can be combined to make a handsome cover, perhaps in combination with appliqué or embroidery. The rectangles can be either joined together or appliquéd to a backing piece.


I prefer using a simple running stitch for appliqué, as I like to be able to see the threads that join the pieces. I have used the blindstitch when this seemed preferable and have also made use of embroidery stitches, though I rely mostly on the plain stitch. This allows the thread showing on top to vary from a dot appearing at intervals to an almost solid line.

Experimenting with fabrics to produce nature's wide range of textures and colors is the focus of this technique class. We will explore the use of discharge (using bleach), ink, crayon and pencil work, foil, and painting.

### Supply list

2 yds freezer paper 1 roll paper towels Disappearing marking pen (air) Fabric markers, black and brown, fine point Plastic spray bottle with trigger handle 2 small containers for water (about 1 cup size) Cotton household string Embroidery hoop

Masking tape, any width

3 or 4 white plastic plates (throwaway) for use as paint palettes

Scissors, fabric, and paper

Paint brushes, med. size "flat" and "round" (for acrylic paint)

One 2" paint brush (costs around \$1.00 at paint stores)

Apron or old clothes, gloves, and mask

Plastic drop cloth and old towel

100 % cotton fabrics, solids only, med to dark range: 12-1/3 yd pieces

2 yds. Muslin or pale yellow, solid color fabric.

### **Optional**

Hair dryer

# There will be a \$10 lab fee for paints & additional lab items that we will share.

March Workshops

Jean Ray Laury will be doing two workshops in March. On Friday, March 14, she will be teaching "Screen Printing on Fabric." Participants will design and print their own fabric for quilts or clothing using the screen process in permanent color. There will be demonstrations and hands-on work She will include quick printing that combines screen printing with cut outs in addition to several other methods. There will be a fee for supplies.


On Saturday, March 15, the workshop is "Photo Transfer to Fabric." Transfer photographs, drawings, etc., to fabric using heat-set transfer papers. The process is simple, direct, versatile, and exciting. In addition to the use of copy transfers and design, dye photo transfers will be included. The latest techniques will be explored. There will be an additional supply fee for this class, too.

The board decided that since workshops are becoming more expensive, the fees for workshops will have to be raised to \$35 per session. This is still a great bargain if you compare the cost of similar workshops at quilt shows, seminars, and in shops.

# Opportunity Quilt 2002


The drawing was held at our December meeting and our beautiful quilt was won by Mary Sanchez of Thousand

### COMMUNITY QUILTS

NEW Year Brings NEW Project for NEW Babies!

The Guild's first Community Ouilts project for 2003 is to make baby quilts for the Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics' Comprehensive Perinatal Services Program. This program provides pregnant and post-partum women with medical services, social services, nutrition counseling, and health education tailored to their individual needs. The baby quilts will be presented to the clients at their post-partum visits, providing an extra incentive for clients to participate in this important part of the program. The Clinics are expanding this program, and therefore, the details regarding total number of quilts and timing of presentation are vet to be determined. More details will be forthcoming in February,

We have some kits left over from the Storyteller project that would be appropriate for this project, and those kits will be available at the January meeting. More kits and pattern ideas will be available in February and March. These quilts should range in size from 36" x 36" to 42" x 42" and may be quilted or tied.






#### Wearable Art Satellite Group
