


### February Speaker



## Textile Expert John Gillow To Speak at Schott Center

The Guild is excited and proud to be working with SBCC Adult Education to bring an international expert on handmade textiles to Santa Barbara. On Tuesday, February 24th at 7:30 pm at the Schott Center auditorium, we will co-sponsor a public lecture and trunk show by John Gillow. Mr. Gillow, of Cambridge, England, is a renowned lecturer, author, traveler, and textile collector who has authored books for such prestigious publishers as Thames and Hudson, The British Museum Press, and Cambridge University Press. His current titles include *Traditional Indonesian Textiles*, and *Printed and Dyed Textiles from Africa*. His newest book, *African Textiles: Colour and Creativity Across a Continent*, was published this fall by Thames and Hudson. His talks have found eager audiences from Durban, South Africa to Lincoln, Nebraska, where in 2003 he lectured at The International Quilt Study Center. He will speak at the DeYoung Museum in San Francisco just prior to his visit to Santa Barbara.

His lifetime's passion for stunning embroideries and woven fabrics has given Mr. Gillow a unique understanding of the role of textiles in world culture and a thorough knowledge and appreciation of textile techniques. His relaxed, hands-on lectures and trunk shows have in-

trigued and thrilled audiembroiderers, textile colists, and scholars on every part cultural history, part Gillow's trademark "show tribal and folk textiles is He has traveled the world lecting, and lecturing on both entertaining and inaround items from his coland fascinating story. produced them. Mr. Gillow will discuss diverse techniques of embroidery, weaving, and embellishment, while his narrative brings to life the peoples who produce them. As more and more of the world develops, these handmade ethnic textiles will become more and more rare and the skills required to produce them will be lost. Mr. Gillow's lecture and trunk show offers a valuable opportunity to see some of "the last" examples of exquisite embroideries and weavings and to learn about their production and use.

A salesroom will be available following the lecture. Because he collects and sells constantly, Mr. Gillow's "wares" change frequently. He'll doubtless have large quilts and other textiles, but he also has many smaller items ranging from table runners to small purses. His prices are likely to range from \$10 to \$600, as they did on his last visit to Blue Island Quilts. Some of his books will also be available for sale and autographing, courtesy of the UCSB bookstore.

Admission for this event is \$10; guild members will be admitted FREE.

### Reviews of Mr. Gillow's books:

### African Textiles

Generously sized and beautifully illustrated, *African Textiles* is an authoritative survey of textile arts—unique and collectible rugs, tapestries, garments, and much more—from across the continent. Five sections detail the textile history and traditions within Africa's major geographical areas, examining materials, dyes, decorations, patterns, and techniques. From the strip weave cloth of the Ashanti in the West to Ethiopian embroidery in the East, from Berber rugs in the North to the Madagascan silk of the South—and everything in between—the breadth of coverage in *African Textiles* is peerless. Robustly illustrated with over 500 color photographs and drawings, this is an exciting new sourcebook for those interested in textile design and the traditional arts of Africa.

### Printed and Dyed Textiles from Africa

To go to any market in West Africa, where the women are swathed in brightly patterned wraps, is to experience an assault on your visual senses. This book, too, is a visual feast, illustrating the richness and diversity of the African textile tradition, and providing designers at all levels with inspiration for their own work. Over 30 textiles from the British Museum's renowned collection are explored in detail: magnificent blue-and-white, indigo-resist-dyed cloths from West Africa; "mud cloths" from Mali; the unique warp-striped weaves and ikats from Madagascar; "adinkra" block-prints and painted "calligraphy" cloths from Ghana and the "adire" cloths from Yorubaland.

In his enlightening text John Gillow provides the background information to bring the pieces to life and clearly explains the full range of principle techniques employed.



# MARCH Block of the Month



"Your Choice"

# MARCH HARE

Rabbits, rabbits everywhere! Wild March Hares....we can't choose, so you'll have to! Are you in the mood for a sitting bunny? A leaping hare? Hand work? Fusing? Blue, purple, yellow? Puce? Chartreuse? You choose!

FABRICS:

BACKGROUND: 9-1/2" square of any pastel solid or pastel tone-on-tone that reads as a solid. Fold diagonally to find center!

RABBIT: A medium to dark print that goes nicely with your background fabric.

Choose one of the two rabbit shapes for your block. Use only one rabbit per block! Your rabbit may face either right or left...you choose! The rabbit will be appliqued to the pastel block "on-point," using your choice of method as follows:

- A. For fusible method, trace desired rabbit shape onto paper side of fusible web. Cut out shape about 1/4" outside drawn line, then cut out and discard center of shape about 1/4" inside drawn line. Tuse resulting "outline" to wrong side of rabbit fabric. Cut out rabbit shape along drawn line. Remove paper from web and, matching "+" to center of pastel square, fuse rabbit to "or-point" block. To secure appliqué, machine satin-stitch around edges.
- B. For hand appliqué, trace rabbit shape onto dull side of freezer paper. Sut out and iron shape to right side of rabbit fabric. Adding a 1/4" seam allowance all around, cut out rabbit shape from fabric.

  Matching "+" to center of pastel square, pin rabbit to "on-point" block. Turning under seam allowance as you go, blind stitch rabbit to block. Remove freezer paper.

Add an eye to your March Hare with satin stitch or a small button.
