

Robbi Joy Eklow is an innovative quilt artist who will talk to us about her own "Free Expression." She has written a book about her quilting and her art, Free Expression: The art and confessions of a contemporary quilter, and her Thursday night lecture will cover the ideas and the quilts from that book. The publisher is Quilting Arts Magazine, their first book and Robbi's too. Robbi also writes an amusing column for their quarterly quilting publication called the Goddess of the Last Minute.

Robbi started working with fabric when she was about four, and made a lot of clothes when she was in high school. She now prefers to spend her fabric time making quiits. She hand dyes cotton, uses fused appliqué to create the tops and then unmarked free motion


machine quilts them heavily. Her latest series of quilts were designed on her Macintosh computer, using an application called Canvas.

Robbi teaches classes on free motion quilting, fused appliqué, and fabric dyeing all over the country, and has exhibited her work in the major national shows: Quilt National, Quilt Festival in both Houston and Chicago, The Mid-Atlantic Quilt Festival, Quilter's Heritage in Lancaster, PA, Pacific International Quilt Festival in Santa Clara, CA, and American Quilter's Society in Paducah, KY.

February 9th Workshop – Free Expression Flowers, Gears, Spirals, and More!

Learn about Robbi's sophisticated and innovative techniques for creating quilts like those in her book: Free Expression: the art and confessions of a contemporary

quilter. In this fun and relaxing class, each student will pick from a choice of computer-designed patterns to complete one 18 x 24-inch top. You will explore designs that exploit the use of fusibles, with demonstrations of free-motion quilting and dyeing techniques. This workshop is excellent for both beginner and intermediate quilters.

# Free Expression Flowers, Gears, Spirals, and More! - February 9, 2007—Robbi Eklow (www.robbieklow.com)

Learn Robbi's innovative techniques to create sophisticated art quilts as described in her book Free Expressions. In this fun and relaxing class, each student will pick one of several full sized patterns, specifically designed for this class, to complete one 18" x 24" top. Fused appliqué will be used in class; however, the designs can be used with traditional methods too! Fused bindings will be demonstrated. Free motion quilting and dyeing techniques will be discussed.

One pattern will be provided for each student

Mechanical pencil

Paper-cutting scissors, 4" or similar sized scissors to cut detailed shapes out of fabric bonded to webbing.

Glass head quilt pins

2 yds. paper-backed fusible webbing (e.g. regular weight Wonder Under).

Fat quarters or larger scraps of cottoned hand-dyes or brightly colored prints. Bring two values of yellow, orange, red, purple, blue and green for a varied palette and a few neutrals for backgrounds.


And a reminder: We have the instruction sheet with the non-binding procedure on the table. If you didn't pick one up last time, come on by.

### Meals on Wheels Placemat

Finished size: 14" x 18"

For the center square use any print fabric or substitute with any 12" finished block. See suggestions to the right.



Fabrics needed (for one place mat) 1 (12-1/2") square or block.

1/8 yard for inner border (or two 2-1/2" x 12-1/2" rectangles)

1/2 yard for outer border and backing

1/8 yard for binding.

arring

lunce borders Two 2-1/2" x 12-1/2"

Outer borders Two 1-1/2" x 16-1/2", two 1-1/2" x 14-1/2"


Backing and batting 15-1/2" x 19-1/2"


Rinding


Two strips 1-3/4" wide by width of fabric. Cut strips at fold. Press strips wrong sides together along the long edges.


Assembly


- 1. Sew inner borders to 12-1/2" square or block.
- 2. Add outer borders.
- Baste top, batting and backing. Quilt as desired.
- 4. Trim batting and backing even with top. Finish with binding.



## Santa Barbara Connection Block-of-the-Month

#### March



Whale Watching - Whale's Tail

#### Fabrics:

Background – Light blue or "sky" fabric (non-directional is best)
Whale's Tail – Dark grey or black (hand-dyed or batik suggested)


Corner piece - "ocean" or "water" fabric

Cut 9  $\frac{1}{2}$ " square of background fabric. (Or you can cut a slightly larger square to allow for some shrinkage when hand appliquéd and trim the completed block to 9  $\frac{1}{2}$ ".) Do not use directional fabric, as to make the design go the correct way it would have to be cut on the bias.

For triangular corner piece and whale's tail, cut freezer paper or fusible web pieces according to pattern. If planning to hand appliqué, you will need to add enough fabric ( $\approx \frac{1}{4}$ ") for the turned-under edge.

Align pattern in one of the corners of the background fabric. Applique the whale's tail first, then place the "ocean" piece over the tail end (see pattern). Be sure that the "ocean" piece is centered exactly, so that the sides are the same.

For machine appliqué satin stitch the edges with matching thread after fusing to the background.
