Message from the VP of Programs

Sometimes it's the tough times that bring out the best in people.

First, Ranell Hansen posted a picture of her husband and herself on Instagram wearing the face masks she had made for them, and asked if anyone else wanted one. Someone asked how much. She said, "Free." In short order she had a list of 21 face masks she was making for people who wanted them.

As I posted a photo of the flying geese I was working on, I mentioned that I had made a face

As you are probably aware, the April Guild meeting has been cancelled as it falls within the parameters of stay at home guidelines recommended by the state. In this way, we are able to avoid any expenses and cancellation fees invoked by the speaker. of friendship and survival! The May meeting was to be our Annual Meeting and election of officers, along with an item on the ballot for approving our new Bylaws. Quilt Show Entry Quilt Storage

HOC 2020 requests that members use a novelty print for quilt storage to facilitate quick identification during return. Have fun, choose a holiday, whimsical or otherwise distinctive print (plaid, story book character, etc.) The 2020 Show Entry Form has space to describe or provide a sample of your quiltcase's novelty print. After our show closes members are eager to take-down and get returns underway. Let's try this novel technique to see if it simplifies entry return for this year's show.



Special Handling (SH) entry - 2 options for delicate entries. 1- completely protect inside securely closed hard-sided cardboard carrier or 2- roll around a pool noodle (or foam pipe insulation), which is then completely encased within custom novelty print quiltcase. Make your SH personal info label (name, address, phone number) on fluo-



rescent (bold, bright) fabric or paper, mount securely to quiltcase/cardboard carrier. Spray paint any accessory items (hanging rod) a bright color, include in carrier. Fluorescent colored labels are reserved for Special Handling only.

**Basic entry* - a novelty print, whether a commercial pillowcase or quiltcase you sew, should be unique, bold and easy to identify at a glance by theme and/or color. One yard of a distinctive print can easily make a quiltcase. Fold right sides together, seam one width and lengthwise edge, overcast both of these seams' raw edges, hem the opening, zipper closure is optional. Be sure your personal info label is boldly displayed, permanently mounted.

Aquisitions

Harvest of Colors, a member showcase, isn't possible without member participation in two basic ways. First, it provides us the opportunity to express our individuality and love of quilting by submitting entries to share with the public. Next, to achieve success of such a big production members need to support the Guild by volunteering for one or more of the necessary jobs. Acquisitions will need your help. The Acquisition team's purpose is quilt control: entry collection, delivery to Judging and Earl Warren. Plus return after the show closes. For efficiency and to prevent overburdening the team many volunteers are necessary. Volunteers work within zip codes. Residency indicates where volunteers are needed. Membership covers a broad area: north of Goleta 10%, Goleta 22%, Santa Barbara 55%, Carpinteria & south 11%, further away 2%. A sign up sheet will be passed around at a future meeting. Please consider volunteering.

Job Description:

- provide a safe, secure, pet/smoke free area to store 10-15 entries between collection and delivery dates
- use email
- contact members to arrange for quilt collection
- follow collector check-in-procedure

Further details will follow as Show time approaches.

Dignity Statue



Dignity is installed near Chamberlain, South Dakota.

Dignity (a.k.a. **Dignity of Earth & Sky**) is a sculpture on a bluff overlooking the Missouri River near Chamberlain, South Dakota. The 50-foot (15.24 meter) high stainless steel statue by South Dakota artist laureate Dale Lamphere depicts an Indigenous woman in Plains-style dress receiving a star quilt. According to Lamphere, the sculpture honors the culture of the Lakota and Dakota peoples who are indigenous to South Dakota. Assisting Lamphere were sculptors Tom Trople, Jim Maher, Andy Roltgen, and Grant Standard. Automotive paint expert Brook Loobey assisted with the colors for the quilt, and Albertson Engineering of Rapid City, SD ensured the sculpture would endure the strong winds common in the area.

Norm and Eunabel McKie of Rapid City, South Dakota announced their gift of Dignity to the State of South Dakota in 2014, in honor of the 125th anniversary of South Dakota statehood. The statue was erected in September 2016 at a site near Interstate 90, where it overlooks the river. It is situated in the Chamberlain Interstate Welcome Center located at mile post 264 and is accessible by both directions of travel.

The statue measures 50 feet (15.24m) high, 16 (4.88m) feet deep and 32 feet (9.75m) wide. The star quilt held by the woman has more than 100 blue diamond shapes that move in the wind "like an Aspen leaf".

Three Native American women from Rapid City, SD served as the models for the sculpture. The artist began by first drawing the form and then sculpting a one-eighth-scale model. The sculpture was created in an isolated area near the Cheyenne River, east of Rapid City, SD, and later moved to the installation site. The statue boldly proclaims that South Dakota's Native cultures are alive, standing with dignity.

Since July 1, 2017 South Dakota residents are now able to purchase auto license plates bearing the likeness of Dignity. The plates were designed with the help of the statue's designer.

When interviewed nearly a year after the dedication, Lamphere said "It's been well-received by the Native community, and by visitors from all over the country. My hope over time is it really gets people to think about the beauty of the native cultures."



Block of the Month for May 2020 May Flowers

12 x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" Unfinished)





This month we all could use a cheerful bouquet to stitch up! It is a Disappearing Nine Patch block, using bright warm florals alongside bright cool florals, framed with white or white on white. Excellent use for Kaffe florals or any other bright floral fabrics in your stash!

Cutting

Cut 4 - 5" Squares

White solid or white on white:
 Bright Warm Color Floral Print:

Cut 4 - 5" Squares

• Bright Cool Color Floral Print:

Cut 1 - 5" Squares

Assembly

Use 1/4" seam allowances.

1. For row one and three, sew Warm Floral squares on either side of a White square. Press toward the floral print.








2. For row two, sew White squares on either side of the Cool Floral square. Press toward the floral print.




3. Sew together rows one, two and three to form a nine patch block.

4. Cut the nine patch block in half vertically and and then each half horizontally.



5. Arrange the four resulting units as shown to make the block. You will need to trim the sides equally to measure 12 1/2" square.
