Her talk centers on a series of stories about quilts, the people who quilt, and how quilting touches our lives. Elizabeth will also present "Power of Quilting", her



most popular lecture, illustrating nine impactful ways we are affected by, and affect others, with our creative work. She will also lead our October workshop on Saturday, October 10, which will debut a new wall quilt she has designed just for our workshop, called "Triad Harmony". 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Tyler Perry's Acceptance Speech at the Emmy's

"A very special thank you to the Television Academy... When I was about 19 years old, I left home, and my grandmother, she gave me a quilt that she had made. And this quilt was something that I didn't really care for - it had all these different colors and these different patches in it. I was guite embarrassed by it.

I had no value in it at all. When the dog got wet I dried him off with it. When I needed to change the oil in the car, I laid it on the ground. I had no respect for this quilt.

Many years later, as I was walking past one of those fancy antique stores that I could finally go in and shop, I saw in the window a guilt that looked just like the one that she had given me. And as I'm in the store wondering where that quilt was, an attendant walked up to me and said, "Let me tell you about this guilt. It was made by an African-American woman who was a former slave, and each patch that she put in represented a part of her life. One part was from a dress that she was wearing when she found out that she was freed. Another part was from her wedding dress when she jumped the broom.

And as I was hearing this story, I became so embarrassed. Here I was, a person who prides myself on celebrating our heritage, our culture, and I didn't even recognize the value in my grandmother's quilt. I dismissed her work and her story because it didn't look like what I thought it should.

Now, whether we know it or not, we are all sewing our own quilts with our thoughts, our behaviors, our experiences, and our memories. Like in my own quilt, one of my memories from when I was about ten years old. I remember my father standing at the door, and I was wondering why he stood there so long. He was frustrated and he walked away, and I asked my mother what was going on. She said he had worked all week and he was waiting for the man to come and pay him, and he never did. They needed the money at the time.

I tell you, she was so frustrated, she turned to me and she said, "Don't you ever stand by a door, waiting for white folks to do nothing for you."

Now I've got to say my mother wasn't a racist, but in her quilt, she couldn't imagine a world where her son was not waiting by the door for someone. In her guilt she couldn't imagine me actually building my own door, and holding that door open for thousands of people. In my mother's guilt, she couldn't imagine me owning land that was once a Confederate Army base, where Confederate soldiers plotted and planned to keep Blacks enslaved, and now, on that very land, Black people, White people, gay, straight, Lesbian, transgender, ex-cons, Latin, Asian, all of us, come together, working. All coming together to add patches to a guilt that is as diverse as it can be — diversity at its best. I stand here tonight to say 'thank you' to all the people who are celebrating and know the value of every patch and every story and every color that makes up this guilt that is our business, this guilt that is our lives, this quilt that is America. Because in my grandmother's quilt, there are no patches that represented Black people on television. But in my quilt, her grandson is being celebrated by the Television Academy. I thank you for this. God Bless You and Good Night.

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My (New) Sewing Machine Juki HZL-F600

When everything shut down in March, I got out all my UFO's. I am slightly embarrassed to say that I had 20 of them. I bought some zippered plastic pouches from Amazon and put each UFO inside. And I put them where I could see them! I had every intention of finishing them this year. Then Karen Pickford called for mask makers, and I started making masks in addition to finishing my UFO's.

From that point on, I literally sewed every day for at least four hours. My 13-year old Pfaff machine certainly didn't like that! I had broken my needle threader, and then my bobbin winder went on the fritz, along with a few other things. I decided it was time to get a new machine. After much internet research, I settled on a Juki HZL-F600. My problem was that sewing machine retailers were not getting machines from their vendors, so this model wasn't available. I waited and watched and in July I found a retailer in Escondido, Sewing Machines Plus, who had finally received Juki's. Hallelujah! I talked to a salesperson who assured me that shipping the machine would be easy and that they had a good return policy. Since I had been assured that I could easily return it, I ordered (at 40% off) and within days I had my new machine.

Sewing Machines Plus added a bunch of extras with my purchase like a table extension, fifteen different presser feet, a presser foot knee lifting lever, an auxiliary spool pin, an eyelet punch, a seam guide and a nice case. What a treat! This machine has many wonderful features such as a speed controller, needle threader, thread trimmer, stitch length adjuster, a separate motor to wind the bobbin, applique stitches, four sewing fonts, and over 200 stitches (more stitches than I will ever use!) I have watched many videos on YouTube explaining all the features of this machine, and the manual is very easy to understand.

I am really enjoying sewing on my new, quiet machine. So far, I have finished three UFO's. I am planning my Christmas quilt for the Guild's Front Porch project in December, and I am taking an online free

motion machine quilting class. It's really wonderful to have a new machine!

My Favorite Sewing Machines

I thought that there was a request for Guild members to write something about their sewing machines a while back; what were our favorite aspects of the machines we most consistently work with? However, I can't find that request when I look back to old emails, and during the initial "Stay at Home" orders I might have been thinking of this 'request' myself. With a few other people, highlighting their machines, we might get a good overview of some of the machines out there. Well, I have 2 machines that I am quite happy with: my Bernina Activa 130, and my Handi Quilter Sweet 16. My husband bought my Bernina for me very many years ago. It was the computerized version, much fancier than I had in mind. But being an engineer, he encouraged me to purchase it. It has been wonderful. The settings are automatic (given the computer screen's settings), and it is a workhorse! It's a solid piece of metal machinery, which doesn't give up, no matter what task I put it to! If I would choose to make garments, it also has an overlock and a double overlock stitch, as well as a button hole, and other basic and decorative stitches, which come in handy. It serves my purposes nicely.

My longarm quilting machine, my Handi Quilter Sweet 16, was newly purchased at Creation Station in Buellton. Though they had the stand-up longarm machines, I only had room for a sitdown longarm, which works just fine for me. Dawn, at Creation Station, puts on days-long workshops, teaching people how to use their machines. For me, this workshop was key; it took away absolutely any apprehension I might have had using a longarm. Basically, I have no fear while working with my Sweet 16! I'm a beginner and have a ways to go until my stitches are fluid, but I couldn't be happier for having the ability to machine quilt some of my own quilts!

These are my 2 trusted sewing machines, both of which I absolutely love!



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Block of the Month for November 2020 Falling Leaves

12 x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" Unfinished)





This block is called Falling Leaves. Get a fall leaf print and yellow, green and brown. Think fall colors.

Cutting

Yellow:

Cut 4 - 1 7/8" Squares Cut 8 - 1 1/2" x 3 1/2" Rectangles • Brown:

Cut 4 - 1 1/2" x 4 1/2" Rectangles • Dark Green:

Cut 4 - 3 1/2" x 4 1/2" Rectangles • Leaf fabric fall colors:

Cut 1 - 4 1/2" Square Cut 4 - 3 1/2" Squares


Assembly

For best results, please use scant ¼" seams.


1. Draw a diagonal line across the 4 - 1 7/8" squares. Cut on this line and sew it together.



- 2. Follow the diagram.
- 3. Make two of these.
- **4.** Follow the diagram for the rest of the block.



- **5.** Finish the block by sewing them together in three rows.
- **6.** Then sew the rows together.



7. Send it to me by the first Monday in November.
