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Community Projects

As mentioned in the May issue of *Coast Lines*, here's one of the placemat patterns we've collected. This pattern, along with others, can be found on the Guild website by clicking the "Community" link. If you need fabric or batting for a community project, please contact any member of the Community Projects Team.

Center Diamond Placemat

Finished size: 14" x 18"

Fabrics needed (for one placemat):

- Scraps for top. See diagram below for measurements:
- 1 fat quarter for backing (or one 15-½" x 19-½" rectangle)
- 1/8 yard for binding (optional).


Cut two strips 2" wide by width of fabric. Cut strips at the fold. Press strips wrong sides together along the long edges.


Assembly:

- 1. Sew borders and corner stones to center square.
- 2. Add setting triangles.
- 3. Add inner borders and corner stones.
- 4. Add outer borders.

Binding method: Baste top, batting and backing. Quilt as desired. Trim batting and backing even with top. Finish with binding.

No binding method: Cut backing into two pieces. Seam pieces together leaving an opening to turn placemat. Layer backing right sides together with top and batting. Stitch around edges. Turn through seam in backing. Stitch opening closed. Quilt as desired.

Quilt Show Jobs

Pre-Show:

- Acquisitions: Collection of show quilts, 10-20 people required; timing open and given later.
- **Set-Up:** Begins Friday morning of the Show, usually at 8 am, 15-20 people.
- Take Down: Begins at close of the Show, Sunday,
 4 pm 8 pm, 15-20 people.

During Quilt Show:

Saturday & Sunday Shifts: 9:45 am - Noon; 11:45 am - 2:00 pm; 1:45 - 5:00 pm.

- Admissions: Sell tickets, provide wristbands to guests.
- Raffle Baskets Ticket Sales: Sell tickets for raffle.
- Opportunity Quilt: Sell tickets for Opportunity Quilt.
- **Community Projects:** Provide information to guests at the booth.
- Education: Assist quilt show guests at the Education booth.
- **Security:** 2 people at each time slot, at each entrance/ exit (seated job).
- White Glove: Monitor quilt displays and encourage guests to look, not touch.
- **Floaters:** 2 people at each time slot (provides additional coverage in case of no-show or additional help needed).
- Volunteer Check-In Desk: Check in volunteers as they arrive and leave.

Preparing Your Show Entry Volunteer Information



Reminders:

- Quilt Entry Forms are DUE no later than August 1, 2022.
- 2022-23 Membership dues must be paid in order for entry form to be accepted.
- Judged quilts require two identical entry forms with two photos and a \$25.00 fee per quilt (maximum is 2 judged quilts).
- Quilt entries will be collected toward the end of August.

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Preparing Your Entry For Delivery to Quilt Acquisitions Collector

Note: Sorry, no safety pins allowed. They are a potential danger to Quilt Control members.

Quilt Label: required for each entry. Use prewashed, ironed cotton. If using a permanent pen, practice writing on a similarly prepared fabric scrap OR machine or hand embroider your information. Basics: who made it, when finished, where. Use full names for people and places. Additional: quilt name, pattern name, for whom or what occasion made. The best choice is to sew a label to the backing prior to quilting. Otherwise appliqué to backing after quilting, before binding. When the label is placed in a corner, often left back, two sides of the label may be secured within the bound edge for more security. Judged entries must have the label's identifying information temporarily covered with a hand basted patch.

Quilt Sleeve: required for each entry. Basic instructions for a 4" quilt sleeve:


- A permanent sleeve may use a coordinating fabric to the quilt face or backing. A temporary sleeve may be of any cotton. Cut fabric for sleeve 9" x the width of your quilt. Piece, if necessary, to achieve width needed. Hem both sleeve sides using ½" to make a double folded ¼" hem. Press.
- 2. Fold the sleeve in half lengthwise, wrong sides together, so both raw edges meet at the bottom, press well. This makes a <u>centerline crease</u>.
- Open the sleeve, still wrong sides together, bring top long edge to <u>centerline crease</u>, press well.
 Bring bottom long edge to <u>centerline crease</u>, press well. These two new fold lines will become your <u>hand sewing guidelines</u> when attaching the sleeve to the quilt.
- 4. Keeping wrong sides together, meet both unfinished lengthwise edges together, pin. Sew a ¼" seam the length of the sleeve. Be sure to backstitch at the ends. Clip threads close to the sleeve to prevent thread tails hanging out. Finger press the seam allowance to one side. Be careful not to un-press either of the hand-sewing guidelines.

- 5. With the seam allowance side of the sleeve flat against the back of the quilt, place one of the hand sewing guidelines ½" from the top of the quilt, pin, hand sew, being careful not to stitch through to the quilt front.
- 6. Keeping the backside of the quilt sleeve flat against the quilt back, pin the lower <u>hand</u> <u>sewing guideline</u> to the quilt, pin, hand sew. The extra fullness of the quilt sleeve's front side creates a channel for the hanging pole to slide through.

Maximum display length is 80". If your quilt is longer than 80" you have two choices using a temporary quilt sleeve.

- Display the lower 80" of your quilt:
 Position and sew the quilt sleeve's upper hand-sewing guideline 79½" up from the bottom edge. The extra upper length of the quilt will hang over the rod, behind the quilt.
- 2. Center quilt's design within permitted 80" display length: Position, pin and sew the quilt sleeve's upper hand-sewing guideline 39½" up from the quilt's horizontal centerline. Complete the reduction of display length by making a temporary hemline 40" down from the quilt's horizontal centerline: turn up, pin and hand baste the excess length to the back side of the quilt.

Quilt storage: During Acquisition, Judging, Hanging, and Take Down, our main priority is quilt security. Entries will be handled by many guild volunteers. Because special handling requires extra work and space, cloth bags are Quilt Control's preferred choice.

Novelty cloth bags are requested for quick identification during return. Use a case which, in a glance, can be quickly located: bold, bright, large print - holiday, animal, sport etc. Customize bag size to the bulk of your folded quilt so that slipping entry in or removing it is not a struggle. The bag's length should be generous enough to extend beyond the entry, keeping it well protected. A zipper is not required. Use an added patch if permanent marker won't show up on your bag, or write directly on the bag: boldly print your name and phone near the hem, on both sides.

Special Handling (SH): entries that are too delicate, can't be folded or have plus accessories (hanging rod sprayed a bright color), must be fully protected and labeled - boldly print your name and phone. There are 3 choices for Special Handling:

- 1. Roll quilt around a tube or swimming noodle, slipped into a **novelty cloth bag**.
- For smaller quilts which can't be folded, use a flat, hard-sided cardboard portfolio case.
 Customize clean cardboard slightly larger than entry, folding cardboard in half or hinging 2 pieces with packing tape. Reinforce the cardboard raw edges with packing tape. Fashion a secure closure (stick-on Velcro strips).
- 3. **Cardboard box**, keeping box dimensions as near to quilt size as possible.

Mailed entries will only be accepted from members who live so far away they can't arrange any other delivery to their Collector. Include a note with your Entry Form stating your entry will arrive by mail. SH must be additionally protected within a mailing box which will be reused for return. Entries won't be returned unless adequate return postage/insurance is provided.

Volunteers Needed For Judging Day

Chris Brown will be the judge evaluating quilts on September 12 and choosing those for awards. This is one very busy time, so we need a lot of help on that day. We also need folks to help

transport quilts to the church for judging; transport quilts to the Show; and organize the judged quilts during the Show.



You can volunteer for this fun day in the following positions:

- **Scribes:** Transcribes the judge's comments about quilts. (10)
- **Holders/Folders/Runners:** Move the quilts to and from the judge's table. (8)
- **Computers:** Assist in inputting judge's comments, award assignments, etc., into the computer. (2)
- Collecting and Transporting Quilts: Will be assigned as needed after all quilts have been turned into Collectors. (4)
