February Program: Patricia Belyea "The Unknowing of Creativity"

February 9, 7 pm, Live Oak Unitarian Universalist Congregation, Goleta, In-person & via Zoom

Via Zoom, Patricia will share her creative journey which began at age 53 when she made her first quilt out of old clothes from Goodwill. Quilting became her passion. "I was a fish who didn't know I was a fish until someone showed me the water."



On one of her many trips to Japan, she discovered vintage yukata cottons. These hand-dyed fabrics with graphic patterns and great colors were ideal for making striking quilts. Patricia is a self taught

quilter and has developed a technique called Complex Curves, which complements the designs of the Japanese cottons she uses in her work.


Patricia and her daughter co-own Okan Arts, a cottage business that imports and offers vintage Japanese textiles through an online shop. The Japanese word "okan" means "Mom." She speaks at guilds, teaches workshops, and writes blog posts about quilting and Japan.

Patricia will take us on her creative journey from that first quilt to her innovative technique of today which she refers to as a big grid with inserted curves. February Workshop: Patricia Belyea, "Make A Baby Quilt Using Curved Templates of Your Own Design"

February 25, 9:30 am - 4 pm via Zoom

Patricia Belyea will lead a workshop on designing curved templates. Rather than buying plastic templates, you can now design and make your own curved templates



for repeat blocks. We start with the basics of making templates (from freezer paper) and move to a confident approach for sewing flat(!) curved seams. The workshop project is a simple baby guilt filled with easy, repeated blocks -

I have exciting news! I am going to roll the library carts into the



Farewell, Amazon Smile

Orphan Block Exchange/Challenge

What is an orphan block? It's a quilt block without a home. It may have been the 36th block in a 35 block

layout, or it might have been a block you made to try out a pattern. You might love it. You might hate it. But for now, it is in a drawer or in a pile ... a block without a home.



Our Orphan Block Exchange/Challenge for February will happen like this:

- Those who come to the in-person Guild meeting in February should bring an orphan block in a paper bag. You will take home someone else's orphan block.
- If you are a Zoomer, mail an orphan block to Ranell Hansen, 539 Walnut Ave., Carpinteria, CA 93013. You will receive someone else's orphan block back in the mail.
- Now comes the fun part. Use the block in any creative way you wish to sew a placemat. The finished size for placemats is 12 x 16". You can take a small block and "log cabin" it until it reaches the right size. Or you can strip piece borders to make the block fit the dimensions. There are free patterns on the Guild website's Community tab. You can also look on YouTube and Pinterest for ideas and tutorials.
- Here is a tutorial of how I made an orphan block placemat: <u>Google Docs link here</u>; <u>Guild website</u> <u>link here</u> (just below Feb 9 program info.)
- If you need backing and batting for your placemat, call one of the Community Projects Team and we can meet you at the locker to get fabric. However, this is a great stashbuster project.
- Bring your completed block to the March inperson Guild meeting, or if you are a Zoomer,

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mail your completed placemat to Ranell before March 1.

It'll be fun to see what someone else did with your orphan block. The placemats will be collected by the Community Projects Committee for donation to Meals on Wheels.

OH YEAH, if you don't have any orphan blocks and still want to participate, there will be EXTRA BROWN BAGS with orphan blocks at the February in-person meeting. If you are a Zoomer, email Ranell at llenar.nesnah@gmail.com with your name and address and I will send you one.

This should be really fun. I am excited to see how they all turn out. Thanks to Elisa Purnell for the great idea.

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In Memorium, Nettie Tate Graham


Nettie Tate Graham, longtime Coastal Quilters Guild member, passed away on November 12, 2022 at age


102, just two months shy of her 103rd birthday. I met Nettie in the quilting workshops through SBCC Adult Ed shortly after I moved to Santa Barbara in 2010. I was drawn to the quiet woman's industrious approach to her projects, her eye for color, her skill, and her shy smile accompanied by a brilliant twinkle in her



eyes. I liked to set up my workstation near hers, and was encouraged to do so by the instructor, Marti Frolli, so I could "keep an eye on Nettie." Nettie was in her nineties, but she was fine! I loved working near her.

I saw less and less of Nettie after the workshops closed, her mobility issues began to keep her home from Guild meetings more often, and then the pandemic shuttered our in-person Guild meetings. But I kept up with Nettie through her daughter, Julie Sommers, also a Guild member. I work with Julie, and Nettie lived in her home. Julie and Nettie kept up the industrious quilting hobby, gifting many new babies





former meeting place) with Nettie's quilts. They

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created a warm, friendly, loving atmosphere to remember the life of a master craftswoman. Nettie's masterpiece guilt, a16-pointed star medallion, was laid over the communion table.

All her life, Nettie was a remarkable person, breaking new ground for women. She served as a captain in the Army Nurse Corp during WWII. After the war, she earned an advanced nursing degree; one of her instructors and friends was C. Everett Koop (later to become the U.S. Surgeon General). She had a long nursing career in private care, obstetrics, pediatrics, and at the old "Sisters' Hospital" in Santa Maria. She helped establish, and then directed, the licensed vocational nursing program at Allan Hancock College, retiring from there in 1980.

A lifelong seamstress, Nettie took up quilting in earnest in her retirement. She worked on quilting projects up until her last days. In fact, the last set of blocks she had been working on, inspired by a

charm pack I had given Julie, were assembled by her daughters after her death and the unfinished quilt was on display during the reception following the funeral service.

Attendees were invited to write down words that described Nettie, which Julie is quilting across the surface

of the quilt. What an inclusive way to honor a woman who nurtured, trained, led, and inspired so many other women throughout her life with unselfish sharing of her many gifts and talents.

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Block of the Month for March 2023 Irish Chain

12" x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" unfinished)



Cutting

For eight four patches cut:

- Sixteen 2" squares of white fabric;
- Sixteen 2" squares of green fabrics various shades & prints.

For eight half square triangles, you can cut:

EITHER


- Four 3 1/2" squares of white fabric;
- Four 3 1/2" squares of Kelly green fabric.

OR

- One 8" square of white fabric;
- One 8" square of Kelly green fabric.

Assembly

- Stitch eight four patches using two 2" white squares and two 2" green squares.
- Stitch eight half square triangles,
 - EITHER using the 3 1/2" squares, drawing a diagonal line and stitching 1/4" in on each side of the diagonal line, cut on the line, press open and trim to 3 1/2" square;
 - OR using the 8" squares of white and green fabric, follow the method on YouTube sites for eight easy half square triangles.
- Stitch the squares together according to the diagram.



Blocks can be sent to Suzanne Ahn, 4848 7th St., Carpinteria, 93013, no later than **March 7, 2023**. In-person attendees, please bring your completed blocks to the meeting.

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Community Projects

Hello quilting friends. The Community Projects team is continually impressed at the generosity and ability of our membership. Together we donated over 100 placemats to Meals on Wheels at our December Holiday party. We have been told how much the gift of these colorful placemats impacts the happiness of the clients who receive the meals from the Meals on Wheels volunteers. Good job!

Thanks for buying fabric from our locker stash at the in-person meeting last month. We were able to

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purchase another roll of batting for your use. If you need batting or fabric for a Community Project, please contact one of the team and we can supply you with what you need. In addition, if you would like to come to shop at the locker, let us know and one of us can meet you there. We have TONS of great fabric, with more arriving all the time.

As always, thank you for supporting our mission of giving back to our community. We are an awesome bunch of quilters and it feels so good to do so much good.
